CLINIC MARCH 13-14: The Thirteenth Annual Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association Clinic is rapidly approaching. We hope you have made your plans to attend and bring the team along, your assistant, the softball coach and an umpire that works for you. Enclosed you will find a tentative clinic line-up about the speakers, topics, times, etc.. Show it to your Athletic Director, Principal, and Superintendent, and make sure you get the day off to attend the weekend of baseball. Softball Coaches will also have sessions once again. We have a number of them already signed up.

BANQUET TICKETS: Enclosed you will find a card to return so we can make a reservation for you for the Friday banquet, Saturday breakfast, and the Saturday noon lunch. Fill it out and mail it back with your check covering your Clinic fees. Admission to the Clinic will be \$20.00 for members this year. It will include all your meals and the opportunity to hear many top-notch speakers. It will also include a nice folder with the Coaches Association logo. If you are not a member of the association it will cost you \$30.00 in advance for the clinic. This will include your membership. High School students rates are \$6.00 for full clinic or \$3.50 per day. If they want to eat the meals, it will cost the student \$20.00. That will include all three meals plus registration.

Remember, if you are not a member of the coaches association by March 1, 1981, the clinic will cost you \$35.00. Make your check payable to the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association. We will only order as many meals and noon lunches as we have paid reservations.

You will notice a slight increase in the clinic cost. We had a increase in our meals and also the plane fare has almost double. We still want to bring in the qualty speakers that we have had over the past years.

CONFERENCE CHAMPION COACHES: Once again the Coaches Association will be honoring the Conference Championship Coaches. The Conference champion who attend the Clinic will be able to pick up a certificate of Conference Championship. This is the third year for this award.

JIM FANNING, DINNER SPEAKER: Jim Fanning, Vice President, Player Personnel of the Montreal Expose will be the featured speaker. Jim was the former General Manager of the Expose until being named Vice-President in 1975. Jim was a graduate of Buena Vista College, received a degree in physical education and a master degree from Univ. of Ill. Fanning worked his way up the Cubs' organization graduating to the major league club in 1954. Jim has been with the Expos since the club's inception in 1968. Jim will also be inducted in the Iowa Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame.

#### OTHER CLINIC SPEAKERS:

WALLY MOON, a 13 year career as a player and coach in the national League, and over 25 years experience in working with young baseballers, is an original founder of ALL\*PRO Baseball Camps. Wally joined the Cardinals in 1954, after five-year stay he was traded to the Dodgers. During his seven year stay with the Dodgers, Moon was on World Championship teams in 1959-1963 and 1965. His life-time batting average of .289. Graduated from Texas A.& M and a Master's degree in Adm. Education.

RON GOLDEN: President and Founder of Baseball Instructional Service, former assistant coach at Ohio State Univ. and a former high school coach, Ron's goal is to share with coaches and players a number of ideas and positive (proven) techniques which will help teach a coach winning ways and attitudes which can be instantly incorporated into a Winning Program. Golden has coached at all levels of amateur play from little league through the colleranks. He has spoken at many clinic throughout the country!

STEVE MINGORI: a member of the Kansas City Royals since 1973, was a key to the Royals lefthanded relief pitchers in 1979. Steve signed with the Cincinnati Red's in 1965, he was obtained by Cleveland in 1970. He came to the Royals in 1973 primarly as a reliefer. Steve has spent 11 years in the big leagues, with a life time ERA of 2.79. Steve went to Kansas State College at Pittsburg and the Univ. of Mo. of Kansas City. Steve still resides in Kansas City working for Metro Plex. GEORGE TOMA: Head groundskeeper for the Kansas City Royals and Chiefs, comes to us for the fourth consecutive year. George started in the late 50's with the Kansas City A's moving to Oakland when they moved west. He came back to Kansas City in 1969 with the Royals, serving both baseball and football complexes. George has received many awards because of his national reputation as one of the best groundskeepers in professional sports. Each year he manicures the super bowl and playoffs fields for the National Football League. We are very fortunate to have the likes of George Toma back.

LARRY SCHULTZ: former University of Colorado baseball coach until they dropped the program last year, presently assistant baseball coach at Iowa State University. Larry signed out of high school with the Pirates, and played pro ball for six years reaching triple A. He went to college during the off-season getting his PHD from Norther Colroado. He scouted for the Cardinal organization. He coached at Wayne State, Fort Hays State and the Univ. of Colorado before coming to Iowa State. Larry coached the Boulder Collegiate team, one of the top teams in the nation. A great pleasure having Larry in Lowa.

ACTION TAKEN BY I.H.S.A.A. The minutes of the Board of Control of the I.H.S. A.A. is enclosed.

SPRING BASEBALL: The Board had previously discussed spring baseball as it relates to the recently enacted spring-summer sports limitation rule approved by joint boys/girls organizations and member schools. Previous correspondence regarding spring baseball and the elimination of same from Cresco, Notre Dame, Independence, St. John and Holy Cross, Leo was reviewed noting the fact that two of the three schools do not currently play summer baseball. Due to the fact that this matter had previously been discussed, it was referred to the joint Board and Council meeting held on June 9th. Additional discussion took place at this time. At the conclusion of same, it was moved by O'Connell, seconded by Sweet and adopted, that any member school currently playing spring baseball and not currently playing summer baseball, may play spring baseball; however they would not be permitted to play in both the spring and summer programs. If the school desires to play spring ball, the season will close on the last day of school. The above action was a result of a recommendation from the Representative Council at their June 9th annual meeting. A letter from Baseball Coach, Gene Schultz, Kee High, Lansing, as it affects spring baseball was reviewed.

Baseball: The Board reviewed at length the Baseball Coaches Advisory Committee minutes. The committee recommended the Board consider summer baseball practice to begin May 1 for all players rather than just pitchers and catchers effective the summer 1981 season. After review the Board expressed the fact that the new spring-summer sports limitation regulations affecting the length of the season and game limitations take effect for the 1980-81 school year. The new limitations were approved by the boys and girls organizations and the membership of both. Recognizing the new sports limitations have been reviewed extensively over the past two years, the Board felt it best to review after the new limitations have been in effect for two or three years. The committee discussed invitational and conference tournament play as it relates to one playing date or two playing dates expressing the feeling of too many loopholes to count two- and three-day tournaments as one playing date and desire for the Board to give consideration to this concern as it would automatically cause for more baseball tournaments over a two- or three-day period abusing the pitching staff, etc. As per the June 8, 1980, Board of Control minutes, the following interpretation as it affects the limitation rule for summer baseball was approved: Note, June 8, 1980 minutes, "Limitation Rule as it affects summer baseball." Inquiry has been made to the Association relative to Summer Baseball Limitation Rule as it affects playing dates in tournaments. After considerable review, it was determined that a summer baseball school could play in a tournament over a three-day period and count it as one playing date or in

two, two-day tournaments counting them as two separate playing dates within the 20 or limitation each member high school summer baseball team would be permitted effective the summer of 1981. This is a clarification over previous correspondence coming out on a Limitation Rule and it has come about only as a result of confusion and misunderstand on the Limitation Rule as it affects summer baseball and softball tournaments counting one or two playing dates. The above clarification is that clarification which the membersl will follow beginning with the 1981 regulations. The Board reviewed the State Tourname format as per the advisory committee's recommendation, both groups recognizing the vantages of playing the first-round game out in the field as beneficial for the overall p gram. The committee spent a considerable amount of time on conduct as it relates to baseball program and reportedly more cases cited of swearing by players at games and  $\dot{w}$ of the opinion that this item not only be covered at rules meetings but in a communique all umpires, coaches and school administrators, stressing the importance of resolving problem state-wide. At this point, the Board of Control reviewed at length the conduct student athletes in all State Association sponsored events and where the authority lies w respect to curtailing the problem of negative conduct.

LIMITATION RULE AS IT AFFECTS SUMMER BASEBALL: Inquiry has been made of the Association relative to the summer baseball limitation rule as it affects playing dates and tournaments. After considerable review, it was determined that a summer baseball school could play in a tournament over a three-day period and count it as one playing date or in two (2) two-day tournaments counting them as two separate playing dates in the twenty date limitation each member high school summer baseball team will be permitted, effective in the summer of 1981. This is a clarification over previous correspondence coming out on the limitation rule and has come about only as a result of confusion and misunderstanding on the limitation rule as it affects summer baseball and softball tournaments counting as one or two playing dates.

## 1981 RULE CHANGES:

### 1981 BASEBALL RULE REVISIONS

1-1-5 1-1-5 1-1-5	Metal cleated shoes will be prohibited affective 1984. Baseball protective shin guards are now required equipment. It is recommended, and will be mandatory in 1982, that all catchers wear a throat protector that is either a part of, or attached to, the catcher's mask.
1-3-5 3-1-1	Metal bats must have a safety grip.  To be legal, all substitutes must now be reported prior to the next live ball.
3-1-5	Any player rendered unconscious may not resume playing that day unless authorized in writing by a physician.
5-2-2	Runner may return to missed base when ball becomes dead, provided the runner did not touch the next base.
7-3-6	When a whole bat is thrown and it interferes with a defensive player attempting a play, interference will be called. This rule does not apply to a broken bat.
7-4-g	Batter is declared out when runner interferes with fielder at-
8-1-1-e	For catcher's interference - offensive team may select penalty or play.
8-2-3 Pen.	Appeal play for baserunning infractions eliminated.
8-2-6	Runners must touch awarded bases.
8-3-3-c	Spectator interference no longer a part of a base award.
8-3-3-e	Umpire may award appropriate bases for spectator interference.
8-4-1-d	Batter is out if ball hits bat a second time in fair territory.
8-4-2-a	Baseline now established by position of runner and base to which he is moving when being played upon.
8-4-2-d	Umpire may also call runner out at end of playing action.
8-4-2-m	Runners "giving up" after at least touching first base to be declared out.
9-1-1-d	When third out is declared during play in which an umpire observed a baserunning infraction, this play takes precedence.
S-1-1-e	When umpire declares more than one out, which terminates the half inning, the defensive team may select the out which is to its advantage.





NOTE: Treasury Regulation 1-162-5 permits an income tax deduction for educational expenses (registration fees, and cost of travel, meals and lodging) undertaken to (1) maintain or improve skills required in one's employment or other trade or business, (2) meet express requirements of an employer or a law imposed as a condition to retiention of employment, job status or rate of compensation. The IRS recommends you keep a daily log of expenses in accourdance with this regulation.
