Show it to your A.D., Principal, and Superintendent, and make sure you get the day off to attend the week-end of baseball. They might want to come along! Remember, your wife is welcomed! We will be having three clinics going on at once, one for umpires one for softball coaches and the baseball clinic. Join us!

**BANQUET TICKETS & MEALS:** Enclosed you will find a card to return so we can make a reservation for you for the Friday night awards banquet, Saturday's McDonalds F.C.A. breakfast, and the Saturday noon lunch. Fill it out and mail it back with your check covering your clinic fees. Admission to the Clinic will be \$20.00 for members. It includes all your meals and the opportunity to hear many top notch clinic speakers. If you are not a paid up member of the association it will cost you \$35.00 in advance for the clinic. This will include your membership.



**CONFERENCE CHAMPION COACHES:** Once again the Association will be honoring the Conference Championship Coaches. The Conference champion who attends the Clinic will be able to pick up a certificate of Conference championship. This is the sixth year for this award.

**CLINIC DINNER SPEAKER:** Bump Elliott, Athletic Director of the University of Iowa, will be the featured Dinner Speaker. Bump has put together one of the finest athletic programs in the country. He is respected as one of the top A.D. in the Country. Bump is a graduate of the University of Michigan, started his coaching at the University of Iowa, and then returned to Michigan to be the football coach.

**JIM McANDREW:** was born and raised in Lost Nation, Ia. competed in baseball and basketball there, went on to the University of Iowa on scholarship. At the University he played for Dick Schultz and basketball for Sharm Scheuerman before graduating in 1965. He signed with the Mets and played minor league baseball in Auburn, N.Y. (A), Williamsport, Pa. (AA), and Jacksonville, Fla. (AAA). Joined the Mets in 1968.




Played in New York until 1973. In December of 73 Jim was traded to the Padres. He reinjured his knee during spring training of 1974, had surgery at the end of the 74 season. In the majors, Jim was in 161 games, winning 37, lost 53, with his best year in 1972 with a 11-8 record.

Presently Jim works for ARCO Coal Sales Company in Denver. He has 3 sons and 1 daughter.

Jim high school coach was Bill Herkleman, baseball coach at Kennedy High School. Welcomed to Iowa once again Jim.

**JAY HANKINS:** Former Kansas City Athletics outfielder, played his college baseball at the Univ. of Missouri. At Missouri Jay also played football. He graduated with an Education Degree in 1957. Played Professional from 1957-63. He was the Athletics



road secretary in the late 60's. Jay managed for the K.C. Royals in 1972 at Kingsport. Presently he is the Midwest Supervisor of the Major league Scouting Bureau.

Jay played in the old Iowa State League for Mason City. He has spoken at our clinic in 1975 and 1976. Welcome back to Iowa Jay.

**FRED PATEK:** One of the great shortstops in baseball, will be with us this year. Fred started his major league career in Pittsburgh in 1968. He was traded to the Royals

**JAY HANKINS--K.C. Athletics** in 1971 where he played shortstop until 1979 when he signed with the L.A. Angels. Fred retired from baseball after the 1982 season. He played in the Play-offs in 1979 with Royals and ended his career with the Angels in 81. We are pleased to have Fred Patek with us this year.




**2--FREDDIE JOE PATEK (SS)**

Fred, 5-4, 145, age 34 (turns 35, Oct. 9, 1979), was born in Oklahoma City, Okla. ... he spent most of his early years in Seguin, Tex., and now resides in Blue Springs, Mo., with his wife Jerri and daughters Heather (7-10-71) and Kimberly (5-21-72). ... Fred is the smallest player in the major leagues ... has outstanding speed and his aggressiveness and knowledge on the bases make

him 1 of the game's premier stolen base artist ... his range, arm and ability to make the double play rank with the best at his position and he is at his bet on the quick, artificial surface at Royals Stadium ... his fielding, base-running and offensive skills will again play a major role for KC in '79.


**DICK PAWLOW:** Entering his 15th season at Western Illinois Univ. as head baseball coach, Pawlow attended and played collegiate baseball at the Univ. of Illinois. He spent seven years in the San Francisco Giants organization, making the climb to its AAA Phenix Club. Dick assisted



Itchy Jones at So. Ill. before taking the head job at St. Joseph's in Rensselaer, In. In 1970 he came to Western Ill. where he has guided his Leatherneck teams to five post season appearances in recording a 268-238 record. Dick has had 10 players sign professional baseball contracts in his tenure at Western. Dick was named District IV Coach of the Year in 1978.


Dick has served on numerous baseball committees and has written a book on baseball called "Action Baseball". Dick is an outstanding baseball man.

**BILL OLSON:** is entering his 23rd year of coaching 13th at Omaha Northwest. His teams at Omaha N.W. have won 2 High School and 2 American Legion State Championships and have been state runner up twice. in high school and three times in American Legion. He has scouted for the San Francisco Giants and worked many baseball schools in the area. Bill's 1983 High School team was proclaimed Mythical National Champions by Easton Bat Company. Six of his graduates are currently playing college ball and have many more in his past 12 years at Northwest.

**DICK BIRMINGHAM:** is a veteran of 25 years of player development placing over 100 players in college and professional baseball. As head coach at Hillcrest in Springfield Mo., and Head of Instruction at Mickey Owen, he is a Nationally known clinician having spoken in 10 states plus Canada. Voted High School Coach of the Year in 1979 and was the Head Coach of the North Team at the 1983 Sports Festival in Colorado Springs. Dick is one of the

## 3A-4A DISTRICT COACH OF YEAR NOMINEES

### NORTH EAST DISTRICT

DICK CORE, Dubuque Hempstead High School, has been coaching for 19 years with an over-all record of 329-135. His 1983 team record was 25-9, winning the State Tournament 3A level. Dick is presently President of the coaches association after serving on many committees and board of directors. He was named Coach of the Year in 1975 and 1979. Dick has been a member of the association for 15 years. He is assisted by Bob Fouche.

CURT NELSON, Maquoketa High School, has been coaching for 4 years with an over-all record of 75-41. His 1983 team record was 33-4, winning the State Tournament in the 2A level. During the past three years his program has had 10 young men go on to further their education as well as play college baseball. He has been a member of the association for 4 years.

GARY ROSS, Maquoketa Valley High School, has been coaching for 5 years with an over-all record of 88-30. His 1983 team record was 28-2, being defeated by Maquoketa in the finals of the Maquoketa tournament. Gary's team won the Tri-Rivers conference, his third consecutive championship and 1 district championship. He has been a member of the association for 5 years.

### NORTH WEST DISTRICT

KEITH CHRISTIE, Algona High School, has been coaching for 24 years with an over-all record of 313-206. His 1983 team record was 22-4, winning the North Central Conference and District Tournament. # **SYNOPSIS OF THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BASEBALL COACHES ADVISORY COMMITTEE October 13, 1983**

The Baseball Coaches Advisory Committee met in the Offices of the Iowa High School Athletic Association Thursday, October 13, 1983, pursuant to notice. Members present were: Dennis Olejniczak, Decorah; William Freese, Davenport; Central; Marv Thelen, Remsen, St. Mary's; David Jauron, Essex.

Following items were covered:

## **BASEBALL MANUAL UPDATE:**

1. The committee reviewed items in the baseball manual and recommended the following be included in the baseball manual as update.

## **STARTING TIME FOR SECTIONAL/DISTRICT TOURNAMENTS:**

A. Place the starting times for sectional and district baseball in the manual. Recommend a one-half hour earlier start for daytime doubleheaders and where necessary to have triple-headers on Saturday afternoon to start one hour earlier with a 1 o'clock start. Starting one-half hour and one hour earlier for the double and tripleheader games would provide a greater assurance to complete the ball games in daylight hours.

## **TAKING INFIELD:**

B. It is the consensus of the committee that a great deal more time is being taken than is necessary when taking infield prior to a ball game by a lot of high school teams. Customarily a 10-minute infield is felt to be very adequate, however, it was noted that it is becoming more prevalent for a given team(s) to take infield with two or three players per position. Taking the time to make all throws to each base by all player personnel, making a travesty of the game when taking "infield". It is the desire of the group that practice not be tolerated and to be emphasized at the baseball rules meetings in the spring and in turn at the baseball coaches clinic(s) and to likewise be placed in the baseball manual.

C. Recommend placing in the manual a reminder to all schools that beginning with the 1984 season metal cleats will be prohibited.

D. **AFTER PUTOUTS.** The committee feels more emphasis needs to be placed on the elimination of the huddle at the pitcher's mound between pitches and/or outs in order to move the game along at a normal pace. Little is accomplished with the huddle other than delay of game. Eliminating the huddle will greatly expedite moving the game along and not detract from the game in any way, shape or form.

The following is a suggested procedure for speedup rules relating to activity after putouts: (1) After a putout in the outfield and with no runners on base the ball shall be thrown to a cutoff man and if desired to one additional infielder before being returned to the pitcher for delivery to the next batter. After a putout in the infield and with no runners on base the ball must be returned directly to the pitcher. (2) Following the final out in any inning the ball must be given to the nearest umpire. The plate umpire will give the ball to the catcher. The base umpire will place the ball on the pitcher's plate.

E. The committee desires further clarification and emphasis on charged conferences, particularly that of the defensive conference with the coach in the dugout, conferring with the pitcher or infielder building up play. In summary, not to abuse charged conference privileges. This item be further clarified in rules meetings next spring and to be emphasized in the manual.

F. Place a statement in the manual in reference to a clarification for junior high school baseball games (7th and 8th grades). The committee recommends a review of the number of junior high school baseball games permitted as per junior high regulations.

G. Delete Item 2, page 23 of the Sports Manual which states "Each team should provide its own warm-up ball for its pitcher."

H. Recommend a statement be placed in the manual specifying baseball players shall not go "the mouth between pitches."

I. Place statement in the manual that "on deck" batter be ready to take his turn at bat.

## **COURTESY RUNNERS:**

2. The committee reviewed the possible use of courtesy runners for the pitchers and catchers when on base. Through state association adoption suggested speedup rules would permit the following relating to courtesy runners: (1) The team at bat may use courtesy runners for the pitcher and catcher as soon as they get on base. The same runner may not be used for both positions. Neither the pitcher or the catcher will be required to leave the game under such circumstances. (2) Players who have participated in the game in any other capacity are ineligible to serve as courtesy runners. (3) A player may not run as a courtesy runner for the pitcher or the catcher and then be used as a runner or batter for another player in that inning. It was explained that perhaps a provision could be added to that whereby courtesy runners be used only at the mutual agreement of both schools, but if used, the above steps would be the procedure to use. However, it would not be mandatory unless mutually agreed by both schools. The Advisory Committee felt best to feel the pulse of the other baseball coaches and report back to the Association as to the feelings for the use of the courtesy runner through the Baseball Coaches Association.

## **TOURNAMENT STARTING DATES:**

3. Reviewed the starting dates for Class 1-A sectionals and classes 2-A, 3-A and 4-A districts. The committee made inquiry with regard to starting all tournaments on the same dates and discussed the possibility of playing back-to-back dates. Discussion centered around the availability of umpires, conflicting dates and availability of umpires in the case of rainouts, pitching personnel in the schools relating to playing back-to-back or alternate date schedules.

## **"CALLING TIME":**

4. To reemphasize at the baseball rules meetings the procedure of "calling time by the umpire" relating to the batter being in and out of the box. Mr. Hartly indicated that he would review this entire procedure at next year's baseball rules meetings and through correspondence with officials.

## **LINEUP CARDS:**

5. Reviewed use of lineup cards and modification of same to include all players, starters, as well as substitutes.

## **FACILITIES:**

6. Advisory Committee members were requested to review in their area the availability of new or improved facilities that would merit playing tournament ball.

## **BASEBALL LIMITATIONS:**

7. The committee reviewed at length with Mr. Saggau and Mr. Hartly the baseball limitations as it affects the starting and playing dates. After review, it was concluded that the Advisory Committee will begin immediate work on a survey of the membership as it relates to those items and work with the administrative staff of the Association Office in developing the questionnaire to present to the Board of Control for consideration prior to polling the membership.

## **SUSPENDED GAME PROVISIONS:**

8. Reviewed suspended game provision as outlined in rule 4-2.4 and 4-2.5. The committee reviewed the notation under Article 4 where it states: "By state association adoption a game terminated by artificial light failure or an automatic sprinkler system shall be called a suspended game and shall be continued from the point of suspension at a later time unless the teams mutually agree otherwise." It was the committee's feeling that the state association should adopt that provision as a part of the suspended game provisions. Discussion followed.

The committee expressed their appreciation to the Board of Control for the opportunity to review the baseball program and offer suggestions and recommendations to the Board relative to the overall baseball program.

B) Executive Secretary's Report:

- (2) Congratulations were offered to the State Championship coaches.
- (3) All-Star Game - It was a very successful project. The only problems encountered were the length between games due to field preparation and some minor transportation problems. All these concerns can be dealt with. Sponsorship was excellent. We need to consider whether the sponsor's fee should be raised to \$75 in order to bring the players in on Thursday evening.
- (4) Clinic - Plans are well under way. Many outstanding speakers have already lined up.
- (5) Honor Roll of Coaches - It is still imperative that we have a representative from every conference.
- (6) Nomination ballots will be sent out with the newsletter.
- (7) Recognition was made of two honors bestowed in Iowa by Collegiate Baseball. John Kuester of Norway was selected 3rd Team All-American and Jim Van Scoyoc of Norway was selected as District V Coach of the Year.
- (8) Concern was expressed over the nearly one-fourth turnover in baseball coaches statewide. School year opened with 39 positions still unfilled.
- (9) Convention accommodations were discussed. Holiday Inn, Sheraton and Stouffers are all interested in our business.



A contingent of six coaches and one former major league player will be inducted into the Hall of Fame of the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association at its Sixteenth Annual Clinic Banquet, Friday, March 9.

The inductees to be honored at Cedar Rapids Washington High School cafeteria are coaches Estel Alexander of Hubbard, Jim Eversman of Newton, Don Mauro of West Des Moines Dowling, Al Seabrooke of Valley of Elgin, Ray Smalling of Ames and Bob Watson of Des Moines Hoover. Player Bob Locker of George is the other inductee.

The seven names bring to 89 the number of Hall of Fame members. The honor roll now includes 60 coaches, 12 players, 12 umpires and five contributors.

ESTEL ALEXANDER--has expressed a lifetime love affair with baseball ever since retrieving foul balls for his older brother as a first grader. A graduate of Sioux Rapids High School in 1951, he batted .435 and earned the respect of the New York Yankees in signing a contract that year. A year later he served in the Air Force and gained distinction on a base team in Korea, then a service team in Amarillo, Texas in being named All-West Texas Amateur. He would graduate from Wayne State (Neb) College in 1958 and begin a highly successful prep coaching career. He owns a 336-184 overall record in 25 years in the high school ranks. He has coached Babe Ruth ball for 23 years and Little League for 18 seasons. As an umpire, his experience spans 20 years and has officiated football for 22 years. Alexander spent a semester at Buena Vista College in 1956, and later earned that college's Alumni Coach of the Year award in 1974.

JIM EVERSMAN--was the foundation upon which successful Newton High School baseball was built. He guided the Cardinals since 1964 to state tournament appearances in 1966 and 1969, and led teams to share conference championships in 1966 and 1967. A graduate of Burlington High School where he was an outfielder, Eversman would star as a first baseman at St. Ambrose College and later at the same position at Northwestern University. Eversman's coaching record is 348-201, with successful assignments at New London (1949-52), Kellogg (1956-58), and Newton. He was a life member of the National Education Association and the Iowa State Education Association. He died in 1982.

DON MAURO--has engineered and continues to mastermind the West Des Moines Dowling baseball dynasty. A loyal soldier of his alma mater, where he graduated in 1949 and played on two state tournament teams, he would return 20 years later and build a 300-91 record as coach. During that period (1969-present) he has led the Maroons to either a share or outright Des Moines Metro Conference title 11 times. Dowling has advanced to the state tournament four of the past eight years, and was state runner-up in 1981. Mauro is a graduate of Drake University, and has coached many players who were selected in the major league draft. Two former players played professional baseball in 1983. Mauro doesn't stop teaching at Dowling. He is the leader of a highly successful clinic conducted in the spring for youngsters between the ages of 12-15. The clinic drew 150 last year. In addition, Mauro is manager of the Bellizzi MacRae American Legion team. The club has won the state Legion tournament the past three years. He has been either coach or manager in that capacity for 15 years.

AL SEABROOKE--is a graduate of Cedar Rapids Roosevelt High School and Upper Iowa College, and past president of the Iowa Baseball Coaches Association. Seabrooke was captain of the Roosevelt 1945 state championship team, and later co-captain of the 1956 Upper Iowa Conference title team which went 18-0. He played baseball in Tennessee and California during his tour of duty in the armed forces, and would return to coach high school baseball in 1956. He began at Victor High School, and a year later moved to Elgin, where he would remain at Valley High School. Seabrooke is a member of the Steering Committee of the I.H.S.B.C.A., and was honored as All-Star coach in 1978.

RAY SMALLING--is credited with starting baseball at Ames High School in 1955, where he helped that school win the Central Iowa Conference championship five times, to two state tournament appearances and the eventual state crown in the summer of 1961. He owned a winning percentage of .775 in the prep ranks, a period of time that dates to 1953 when he organized and coached baseball and softball in Guttenberg. Smalling is a graduate of Janesville Consolidated High School, the University of Northern Iowa, and is a master's degree recipient from the University of Iowa. He played catcher for the then-Iowa State Teacher's College (1933-35), and was selected to an all-time 35-year team. After his prep career at Janesville (1927-31), he was offered a contract with Crookston in the Northern League. He would play on the old Waterloo Cardinals team in 1935 before devoting his time to Guttenberg baseball. Smalling's umpiring experience is also vast, having officiated high school baseball from 1938 to 1954, and working 10 years in the Big 8 Conference. As a fan, who but Smalling can say that he watched Babe Ruth strike out against the White Sox, and thrilled to Lou Gehrig's hitting the "circuit?"

BOB WATSON--is a highly successful coach in both baseball and basketball at Des Moines Hoover High School. A graduate of Des Moines Roosevelt High School in 1949 and a player for the Roughriders and later the University of Northern Iowa, Watson began his coaching career in 1954 at Fort Riley, Kansas. From there he moved to Cumberland and Massena Community Schools to post a 40-35 record and the spring sectional title in 1956. He began coaching in Des Moines at Tech High School in 1967, and moved to Hoover in 1968 where he has remained. He owns a 205-143 mark at Hoover, a record that includes three Metro titles (1975, 1979, and 1980), and the 1980 district title. He was honored at the 1980 District Coach of the Year, and is current president of the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association. As a basketball coach, Watson has led Hoover sophomore teams and Tech teams for a combined 22 years. His 243-145 record includes two city series titles at Tech, and six Metro crowns at Hoover. His teams once enjoyed a 39-game winning streak (1977-79), which included two 18-win seasons.

BOB LOCKER--is a former major leaguer, having distinguished himself for 11 years in the big leagues with the Chicago White Sox (1965-69), the Seattle Pilots (1969), Milwaukee Brewers (1970), Oakland A's (1970-72 & 1974), and concluding his career with the Chicago Cubs (1975). Locker is a relief pitcher those 11 years, and appeared in the 1972 World Series against the Cincinnati Reds. A graduate of George High School in 1956, Locker would go on to play outstanding ball for Iowa State before earning his degree in 1960. Locker now lives in Lafayette, Calif. He finished with a 56-38 record.

**ACK ANDERSON**, Grand Junction, has been umpiring for 26 years, working 75 games counting tournaments. Conferences worked are the Des Moines Metro, Big 8, Midwest. Jack worked the State Tournament Series. He has a Certified classification. Umpired in 13 consecutive State Tournaments, 3 All-Star Series, 2 years in the NAIA college play offs at Buena Vista College; 17 years working college baseball. He has been a member of the Association for 4 years.

**DON RHODES**, Clarinda, has been an umpire for 21 years. He worked in 120 games as well as N.B.C. National Tournament. Conferences worked include the Big Eight, Iowa Jr. College, and Missouri College League and the Hawkeye Eight, Tall corn and Corner Conferences. He has a Superior classification. He has worked in the 1982 All-Star series. Don has been a member of the Association for 3 years.

**PAUL SOMERS**, Creston, has been an umpire for 22 years, working 40 games as well as the State Tournament Series. Conferences worked are: Tall Corn, Des Moines Metro, Little Hawkeye, Rolling Hills, Missouri Intercollegiate. Paul has worked 10 consecutive state tournaments and several All-Star Series. He has a Certified classification. Named District Umpire twice. He has been a member of the Association for 10 years.

## SOFTBALL SPEAKER:

**TRICIA M. STOCKMAN**: Assistant Softball Coach at the University of Iowa, has a great record for her softball background. A 1982 Hall of Famer in the I.H.S.A.U. for her outstanding career in high school at Clear Creek (Oxford) Iowa, where she had a career record of 85-15 pitching record. She went on to U.N.I. and coached at Crestwood High School. At Crestwood she coached softball, basketball, and track. She is an All-American A.S.A. softball player. She is one of the best softball teachers in Iowa. She was recognized as 1st Team All-State Softball in Iowa in 1982.

**DAVE KARAFF**: Head baseball coach at Hickman Mills, High School in Kansas City, Mo. Dave has been the head coach for 11 years, with an over-all record of 115-100. He was named the 1982 District Coach of Year in the American Baseball Coaches Association. He has lectured at the Missouri University Clinic and area clinics in K.C.. Dave also scouts for the St. Louis Cardinals in the off season. He is very highly thought of in the Kansas City Area.






