ANNOUNCE THE 1988 ALL STAR SERIES AT UNIVERSITY OF IOWA BALL DIAMOND, AUGUST 4-5-6-7, 1988: The Twelfth Annual All Star Games will be held in Iowa City, Aug. 5-6-7, 1988. Any coach who feels he has a player or two who should be playing in the All Star Games should fill out the Player Recommendation sheet that is enclosed in this Newsletter. Please enclose a photo of your player (if available) on the recommendation sheet. The guidelines for the All Star selection can be found on this sheet. All the advance information we can get on the best ball players in the state would help in the selection of the best All Stars.

The Board of Directors passed a policy that any player or coach selected to participate in the All Star Series must have a minimum of \$100.00 of sponsors' fees. More would help to defray the cost of the All Star Series. It will be the high school coach's responsibility to get the player's sponsors if he wishes him to play in the All Star games. This policy is necessary in order to offset the high cost of putting on the All Star series. If you have any questions about this policy, contact any officer or director in your area; they will explain it to you. Sponsor names and fees and names must be paid to Executive Secretary no later than Monday, August 1, if your player is selected.

10/ Saturday afternoon games will begin at 2:00 p.m. Small Schools West vs. Small Schools East followed by Larg Schools East vs. Large Schools West


11/ Meals will be served at the Motel and Church services will be provided at Motel.

13/ The two teams with best records will play for 1st and 2nd place following the first game.

14/ Medallions will be presented players following each game.

15/ M.V.P. players will be announced after each game on Sunday.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE RULES:

1/ All players chosen must play.

2/ The pitchers can pitch a full game.

3/ All games will be 7 innings in length unless extra innings are necessary.

4/ Tie breaker system will be announced in advance for who will play for 1st and 2nd place. Example: Head to Head competition, most runs scored, least runs given up, most hits, least hits given up.

All of the examples can be given points. The two teams with the most points will play for 1st place.

This system will give more boys an opportunity to play and show what they can do. We will not restrict a pitcher on amount of innings he can pitch in one day.

Coaches were picked by the Steering committee! They filled out an application that was found in the last newsletter.

*****Players who do not make the All District Team will still be eligible to play in the All Star Series. ****

If a coach fills out a player profile form that is found in this newsletter and sends it in, this player will have the same opportunity as a player on the All District Team. This system was necessary because of a number of good ball players being left off the All Star Squads, because a coach could not get enough votes for his player at the All District Selection meeting.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

IOWA HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION

STOUFFERS HOTEL, CEDAR RAPIDS

MARCH 10, 1988

Meeting called to order by President Jim Kloewer at 7:00 PM with 31 present. After introductions, Andy McGaffin moved to accept the minutes from the previous meeting, second by Jim Gebhart, carried.

Jim Brems gave a financial report, announcing that we are still solvent with something over \$16,000 in our interest-bearing account. He adjourned to go over the report with the audit committee. Terry Heald moved to accept the report, second by Dick Core, carried.

Executive Secretary Pinky Primrose, lectured, prodded, cajoled, informed, speculated, recommended, instructed, implored, and commanded for 43 minutes. Points of particular interest:

- 1. Reminder to coaches: everyone must be nominated to play in the All-Star series. All-District selection is no longer the # 1 priority for selection to an All-Star team. The # 1 priority is now nominations, the # 2 priority is All-District selection and the # 3 priority is that the coach of the player is a member of the Association.
- 2. All coaches should encourage their umpires to join.
- Only 14 boys can be placed on an All-District team.
 Ties must be voted off.

Hall of Fame report--none.

11-District report--Ken James reminded us of the two ballot

Awards report--Ed Feyen stated that the Marv Thelen award is still being worked on. There was mention of a District Contributor award.

All-Star report--Pinky said everything is go.

Umpire report--Terry Curtis stated that the Newcomer-of_Year award needed to be further defined. All of us should be working on our umpires to join the association. All-Star assignments are working out well.

Vince Meyer Award report--Lanny Peterson recommended there be no limit to the number of nominations.

Academic All-State report--same as Vince Meyer report

Steering Committee report--none.

Audit report--Lenny Weih said that everything seems in order.

All-State Rating report--Bob Watson reported that the Register and Tribune is no longer going to carry our poll.

Membership report--none.

Constitution report--none.

All-State Coach report--none.

President's report--three comments:

- Jim has been in contact with Boone and feels that the IHSAA will make a move concerning game limitations.
- IHSAA does not sound encouraging about spring baseball.
- 3. A letter was received from Warren Woebking who wants to meet with baseball coaches to see if something agreeable can be worked out concerning summer camps.

New Business:

Move by Curtis and second by Weih to move Charter Oak-Ute back into the S.W. district. Carried.

Move by Watson and second by Heald to accept the budget. Carried.

Move by Don Miller and second by Weih to raise the executive secretary salary to \$4,800 plus National Convention expense. Carried.

After a discussion on redistricting, it was decided to form a committee to move boundary lines in an effort to even out numbers.

After discussion on a possible clinic date change, it was moved by Miller and seconded by Paulsen to distribute a questionnaire to membership. Carried.

Move by Denny Theissen and second by James that either Iowa City or Cedar Rapids be the 1989 site of the All-Star game and that Iowa State University, be contacted as the possible 1990 site. Carried.


Move by Terry Heald and second by James that the 1989 All-Star site be Cedar Rapids. Carried.

Andy McGaffin reported that 38 players and 37 coaches were in attendance at the Spencer clinic, with 16 new memberships being recorded there.

Meeting called to order by President Jim Kloewer at 10:55 a.m.

Secretary Zahn introduced the district representatives and read the minutes of the March 10 board meeting. Move by Don Miller and seconded by Tim Milner to accept the minutes. Carried.

Treasurer and Audit report--Lenny Weih reported that everything seems in order. He also recommended that coaches try to encourage umpires to join the association.

President's report--Jim mentioned that the IHSAA is looking at the game limitations problem. Also mentioned that a letter was received from Warren Woebking who wants to meet with baseball coaches to see if something agreeable can be worked out concerning summer camps.

Executive Secretary report--Pinky reminded us of the following:

- District meetings.
- 2. Exhibitors
- 3. Mini clinic host duties
- All-Star game at Iowa City with accommodations at the Rodeway Inn. Coaches <u>must</u> fill out a nomination form for a player to be considered.
- Five new members of the Hall of Fame being inducted tonight.

All-District report--Ken James reminded coaches of the two ballot rule. He also recommended that the N.W. and S.W. districts each nominate their 3-A and 4-A coaches, then in the fall, they combine to finalize the selection of three 3-A coaches and three 4-A coaches with it being possible that they could be from the same district.

All-State report--It was recommended that the N.W. and S.W. be combined as Ken had just recommended above.

Hall of Fame report--Bill Freese gave a brief history and expressed concern about the few number of coaches being elected especially since the longevity of coaches is not very great. He would appreciate more nominations.

Constitution report--no changes.

Membership report--Phil Lebo encouraged members to work at getting more umpires enrolled in the association and also work on your conference coaches. The committee will get a letter out shortly before conference meetings.

All-State Rating report--on hold until we can talk to Bob Denny of the C.R. Gazette.

All-Star report--everything moving smoothly.

Umpires report--Should try to sell benefits that the umpires would get from being members. It was recommended that Terry Curtis head up the umpires clinic since Fr. Collison was unable to attend. Also recommended that the Newcomer Award not be given unless the recipient is in attendance at the meeting. There is a need for AD's and coaches to encourage graduating seniors to consider umpiring/officiating.

Steering report-Discussed selection of All-Star coaches. Recommended Lenny Weih for office of Secretary.

Vince Meyer $\mbox{report--Reviewed rules}$ of nomination and process of selection.

Awards Committee report--Ed Feyen recommended that the

contributors award be given Marv Thelen's name. Discussed district contributor award and recommended doing nothing wit this award at this time. Discussed an award for professional scouts but no recommendation at this time.

Old business: none

New business:

Moved by Ken James and second by Ray Tisdale that Lenny Weih be the new Secretary. Carried.

Move by Ken James and second by Curt Nelson that the N.W. and S.W. districts each nominate their choices for 3-A and 4-A coaches and then the two districts combine in the fall and finally select three 3-A west coaches and three 4-A west coaches, it being possible that they could be from the same (N.W. or S.W.) district. Carried.

Move by Ed Feyen and second by Don Taylor that the Contributor Award be given Marv Thelen's name. Carried.

After some brief announcements, it was moved by Tim and seconded by Terry that meeting adjourn. Carried.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:45 a.m.





Scout's Corner

The Foundation Of Major League Baseball Ghostelike Scouts See, Judge, Gamble

You've seen 'em — the scouts. Like ghosts they appear, note books under their arm, stop watches in hand, in ball parks all over the state. They hustle the lineups, make their marks, visit briefly with the local fans, chat with their colleagues and disappear — as ghostly as they had appeared — leaving no indication as to what thoughts passed through their minds.

Who are these people? From where do they come and where do they go? Just what is their role in baseball? What do they write in their little books?

The scout is the foundation upon which major league baseball is built. For every ball player in the Big Leagues there is a scout who had the sound judgment — and faith in that judgment — to give the player a chance to be a Big Leaguer. The scout recognized ability and sold that ability to his employer.

A scout is a great many things.

Ex - Anything

He is an ex-ball player, an ex-umpire or an ex-anything — coach, detective, plumber, barber, teacher, salesman, policeman, newspaperman. He is a man with a devout love for our national game and the ability to look at both the inside and the outside of a player and project what he sees into the future.

He is nearly always a family man. And too much to suit him, he is a father and husband by telephone. His job takes him from his home for weeks on end and he learns to live with the lone-liness which can plague a man in a crowd.

He is a travel agent, a secretary, a Duncan Hines of sorts, who, by experience, learns the best motels, hotels, restaurants and coffee stops. He knows the back roads and the interstate highways. He can go straight to the ball park in every town — big and small. He is as much at home in Milwaukee as he is in Hayward.

The scout can read a city map in a glance and produce a list of phone numbers as thick as the Milwaukee directory. He has a friend at every crossroad. The scout has a cast-iron digestive system which gets stoked at any point of the 24-hour day. He knows the taste of the good steaks and the flavor of hot dogs. He eats a lot of both — primarily the latter.

He can tell you where the washateria can be found in every town. He knows the location of the one-hour cleaners because these are his places. The scout is an accountant who juggles his personal account and club expenses with a deftness which must leave him traveling money and his family a comfortable living.

The scout becomes a professional driver. His travels by car may take him more than 50,000 miles a season. He drives with one eye on the road, one on the direction signs and tunes his sixth sense in on the drivers who surround him. He becomes the master of distance and timing and can see three games in three states on the same day. And with the responsibility of half a dozen states, normally, becoming such a master is a necessity.

Weatherman

The scout can read an airline schedule faster than the agent at the ticket counter. He can glance at a weather map and predict

the day with uncanny meteorological sense. He can find a game in the midst of storms just by following the pain in his big toe.

He is usually a hunt-and-peck typist who must make hundreds of reports each year concerning the kids he sees. He does as much paper work on the fly as many secretaries will do in an eight-hour day. His prose often is poetry when he describes a player he wants badly. He may not have a high school education, but the scout can paint a word picture with the deftness of a novelist.

Risky Wagering

The scout is a banker investing a club owner's money in a project full of variables which must pay off. Too many bad investments and the banker is no longer a banker. A scout must have the coolness of a riverboat gambler. He may bet 10 times his annual salary on the strong right arm of a 17-year-old boy who hardly shaves — a kid who may never have spent a night away from home. Risky wagering at the best.

The scout's little book is his livelihood. He's not keeping score at the ball game. Rather, he's making notes about a player's size, age, abilities, etc. He sees hundreds of games a year and his information file grows through the years to rival the record-keeping of the FBI.

The scout judges a player primarily on five points...running speed, arm strength, fielding ability, hitting ability and desire to play the game. He fills his book with quaint little notes and marks which would send a cryptographer into shock.

His secretive mannerism of flipping his book open and shut between marks is a throwback to the days when scouting was a cut-throat operation and there was little friendliness among the breed. Now, with the baseball draft acting as a great equalizer, the scouts are a much more fraternal body.

A scout without his book is like a preacher without his Bible — like Babe Ruth without his bat.

Basic Judgments


The scout is truly a ghost. He comes unannounced. He sees a boy in a pre-game workout, he sees him at the plate and watches the pitchers work and makes some basic judgments. He is sitting next to you one minute, the next minute he has resolved his judgments and is in his car rolling on to the next game.


His salary is not high. He often works without pension or retirement benefits. He could make a better livelihood, perhaps, on an 8-to-5 job or flying a desk. But he loves his work. He is a big leaguer in his own right. And, when the hectic season is history, he enjoys the quiet winters with his family and the inner satisfaction of seeing his kids play in the Big Leagues.

He is truly an amazing person — the scout — this ghost of the diamond upon whose judgment and dogged devotion the National Pastime has been built. And did you know there are no scouts in Baseball's Hall of Fame. Only the fruits of their efforts are enshrined.



MEETING **MINUTES**

APPROVED BASEBALL INDIVIDUAL LIMITATION RULE MODIFICATION. **EXCEPTION TO BASEBALL LIMITATION RULE**

EXPLANATION. There is a major problem in developing pitchers at the varsity level in high school baseball. Because of our limitation rule, it is very difficult for a ninth- or tenth-grade varsity player to get experience as a pitcher on the junior varsity, sophomore or freshman level without exceeding the individual player limitation rule of 20 playing dates.

High school teams are having a more difficult time training pitchers for that very reason. A young man should not be penalized if he is good enough to play varsity baseball as a freshman or sophomore, therefore, modification of the individual limitation rule is recommended. Any ninth- or tenth-grade player on the varsity as an infielder or outfielder would be permitted to play on the junior varsity level without jeopardizing their individual date limitation rule of 20 playing dates. If a ninth- or tenth-grade player plays any position other than pitcher on the junior varsity, freshman or sophomore team, it counts toward his individual player limitation rule of 20 playing dates.

This modification of the limitation rule is with the intent of helping to train pitchers at the lower level, making high school baseball a better sport. This will aid all baseball programs in the development of pitchers without jeopardizing the limitation rule. this is a logical sequence in developing pitchers. No doubt there will be some coaches who will attempt to circumvent the purpose of this modification. The vast majority of the baseball coaches will understand it, abide by it, and be appreciative of the Board of Control's modification. It was moved by Connell, seconded by Hoffman, to approve the baseball date limitation rule as modified below. Motion carried unanimously.

MODIFICATION OF PLAYER LIMITATION RULE

Any time an 8th-, 9th- or 10th-grader pitches on the junior varsity, freshman or sophomore team, it does not count toward the individual player limitation rule of 20 playing dates. (This rule applies to any player that is in 8th, 9th or 10th grades as of May 15.) Playing any position other than pitcher on the junior varsity, freshman or sophomore team counts toward the individual player limitation rule of 20 playing dates. An 8th-grader will not be eligible to play in games until he has completed the 8th grade. He may practice.

PROPOSAL FROM BASEBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION. The Baseball Coaches Association is requesting the Board of Control look at the individual limitation rule as it pertains to baseball and have recommended the Board of Control grant younger players the opportunity to participate in more games than the current infielder or outfielder would be permitted to play on the junior varsity level without jeopardizing their individual date limitation rule of 20 playing dates. If a ninth- or tenth-grade player plays any position other than pitcher on the junior varsity, freshman or sophomore team, it counts toward his individual player limitation rule of 20 playing dates.

This modification of the limitation rule is with the intent of helping to train pitchers at the lower level, making high school baseball a better sport. This will aid all baseball programs in the development of pitchers without jeopardizing the limitation rule. This is a logical sequence in developing pitchers. No doubt there will be some coaches who will attempt to circumvent the purpose of this modification. The vast majority of the baseball coaches will understand it, abide by it, and be appreciative of the Board of Control's modification. It was moved by Schmidt, seconded by Pyle, that the following modification of the player limitation rule be approved. Motion carried

unanimously.

HELP SUPPORT IOWA HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL

Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Ass'n.

REVIEWED WITH MEMBERS A SURVEY TO BE SENT TO THE MEMBERSHIP REGARDING BASEBALL COACHES EJECTIONS FOR UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT. Council members reviewed the lack of penalty inclusion for the removal of coaches from baseball games for unsportsmanlike conduct. Following review, it was the consensus of the Council to survey the membership in accordance with the Board of Control directives cited in their March 18, 1988 meeting.

PENALTY CONSIDERATION FOR BASEBALL COACH EJECTION. Considerable discussion has been generated in prior meetings with regard to penalty provisions for baseball coaches ejected from games. It was noted that in most sport programs such as football where there is a stipulated penalty other than removal, the same in basketball, that baseball is the one sport where no penalty provision is provided other than removal from the game. Discussion centered around the following: The first time a coach or assistant coach is ejected from a baseball game, two things must take place (1) game officials must call the Association collect and then follow up with a written report; (2) head coach must inform their school administration prior to their next contest of the ejection. The second time the assistant or head coach from that school is ejected, their schedule of games would automatically be suspended until the school administration from that school meets with members of the Board of Control to determine (a) whether to continue the season; (b) be denied the opportunity to play in tournament competition, or (c) both of the above. Review was made of the baseball player ejection also, noting that when any player is ejected from a baseball game for unsportsmanlike conduct an automatic penalty of ineligibility to participate in the next two playing dates be a consideration. The second time he is ejected for unsportsmanlike conduct, he would be ineligible for the next six dates. Following discussion, the Board of Control directed the staff to survey the membership regarding the consideration of a policy.



BALK RULE

One of the most misunderstood rules in baseball is the balk rule. A balk is an illegal act by the pitcher with a runner or runners on base, entitling all runners to advance one base

It is a balk when.

The pitcher, while touching his plate, makes any motion naturally associated with his pitch and fails to make such delivery.

—The pitcher, while touching his plate, feints a throw to first base and fails to complete the throw.
—The pitcher, while touching his plate, fails to step directly toward a base before throwing to that base.
—The pitcher, while touching his plate, throws, or feints a throw, to an unoccupied base, except for the purpose of making

a play.

The pitcher makes an illegal pitch.

The pitcher delivers the ball to the batter while he is not facing the batter.

The pitcher makes any motion naturally associated with his

pitch while he is not touching the pitcher's plate.

—The pitcher unnecessarily delays the game.

The pitcher, without having the ball, stands on or astride the pitcher's plate or while off the plate, he feints a pitch.

The pitcher, after coming to a legal pitching position, removes one hand from the ball other than in an actual pitch, or in

throwing to a base.

—The pitcher, while touching his plate, accidentally or intentionally drops the ball.

—The pitcher, while giving an intentional base on balls, pitches when the catcher is not in the catcher's box.

The pitcher delivers the pitch from set position without coming to a stop.

If, with a runner on third base trying to score by means of a squeeze play or a steal, the catcher or any other fielder steps on. or in front of, home base without possession of the ball, or touches the batter or his bat, the pitcher shall be charged with a balk, the batter awarded first base on the interference and the
