

CLINIC SPEAKERS:

MIKE BODDICKER: Played his high school baseball in Norway and then went on to the University of Iowa, playing third base and pitching. He signed a contract with the Baltimore in 1978, playing 4 years in the minor leagues and going to the Big Leagues in 1980. He spent 9 years in the Baltimore organization before being traded to the Red Sox in 1988, spending three years with the Red Sox, and then on to the Kansas City Royals. Mike has pitched in over 200 major league games, winning 130 plus while only losing 100. He has a career strike out record of 1,200 plus. He has pitched in three League Championship series and one World Series in 1983. He also pitched in the 1984 All- Star Series. Mike retired in 1993 from the Milwaukee Brewers organization after injuring his arm. Mike will be inducted in the Hall of Fame this year.

BRUCE KIMM: Played his high school baseball in Norway and signed with the Chicago White Sox in 1969. Bruce played 7 years in the minors before going up to the majors as a catcher. He was traded to the Detroit Tigers, where he caught the "Bird" Fidrych. Bruce then was traded to the Cubs and then back to the White Sox in 1980. Bruce retired from baseball in 1981. Since then he has gone into managing in the Red's organization and became the third base coach for Pete Rose, and for the past 9 years he has coached in the major leagues. His last coaching job was with the San Diego Padres as a third base coach. Bruce was an All-Stater in High School. In 1993, Bruce was the Double A manager in the Atlanta Braves organization this past year, taking the team to the League play- offs. In 1994, Bruce will be with the Braves Triple A team. He will be inducted in the Hall of Fame this year.

HAL DYER: A scholarship athlete at Florida State, Hal brings a wealth of coaching experience to our state clinic. This is Hal's third visit to the Clinic. Hal spent six years in the minor league baseball as a catcher, followed by successful stints in high school (Cincinnati), amateur, and junior college coaching. In each of two seasons at Pratt, Kansas, Dyer's junior college baseball program produced state JC championships. Dyer then moved into coaching at the professional ranks as field manager of the Bristol Tigers in 1984. He presently manages in the Pirates Class A Team and is running the Winter League program for the Pirates.

DUANE BANKS: Head baseball coach at the University of Iowa since 1970. His overall record at Iowa is 717- 467 (62.2%). The 1993 record was 32- 22. Banks was inducted into the A.B.C.A. Hall of Fame two years ago and is a IHSBCA Hall of Famer. He has served as past president of the A.B.C.A. and is one of the

leading college coaches in the country. Duane has been named both Big Ten Conference and District Coach-of-the-Year. Many of his former Hawkeyes have earned pro contracts and several have made it to the major leagues.

BOB RANDALL: Former Minnesota Twin second baseman, now coaching in his ninth year as Iowa State University head coach. Bob's 1992 team was one of the best in many years at Iowa State, with a 32-23 record, while posting the fewest Iosses of any Cyclone squad under the tutelage of Randall. The past four years the Cyclones have had winning campaigns. Bob has sent 12 players into the professional ranks, several going into the big leagues. The 1993 team record was 17-28, giving Bob an overall record 251-259 in the Big Eight Copnverence. Bob played his college baseball at Kansas State, signed his first professional contract after being selected an All-Big Eight shortstop. He was drafted by the Dodgers and spent six years in their minor league system before being traded to the Twins in 1975. His best years was 1978 when he hit .270.

STEVE BORIS: Presently the Kansas City Royals third base coach, Steve comes to the clinic for the first time. His background consists of time in the Minor and Major Leagues as a player and manager. He started off in the Tiger organization in 1957. He signed a bonus contract with the Tigers in 1957...played professionally for 13 seasons, including portions of 7 years at the big league level with stops with the Tigers, Cubs and Reds. His best year came in 1961 when he hit .270 with 62 RBI in 116 games for Detroit. He logged a streak of 50 consecutive errorless games at 3rd base with the Reds in 1964. Steve has managed in the Big Leagues and Minors since 1970. His major league team was the Oakland A's in 1983- 84 and the San Diego Padres in 1986. He has had coaching stints with Montreal, San Diego and Los Angeles besides the Royals.

CAL ELDRED: Urbana native, now on the pitching staff of the Milwaukee Brewers, coming off a 16-16 record last year, pitching the most innings in the American League and only second to Greg Maddox of the Braves. Cal was a first round draft pick in 1989 with the Brewers, playing 3 years in the minors before being called up to the big leagues in 1991. Cal finished the 1992 season as one of the best young pitchers in baseball.

JACK ROEDER: General Manager of the Cedar Rapids Kernels (formerly the Red's), has been a General Manager in minor league baseball for 10 years, the past two with Cedar Rapids. Jack grew up in Goose Lake and went to Clinton Comm. College. He coached after graduating from college back at Clinton Comm. College. He went into professional baseball as an assistant GM and then took the head GM job at Wausua, WI. He came to Cedar Rapids in 1991. The past year he was named Midwest League General Manager of the Year. This was his second honor as GM of Year. Jack is one of the best in the minor league system.

JOEL LEPEL: Has spent most of his career in baseball, as a player, assistant coach, manager and presently a scout. He graduated from Plato, MN high school, going to Mankato Univeristy, where he was a catcher. He signed with the Montreal Expose in 1980. He played in the Expos organization for three years. He then went to Western Kentucky for his Master Degree. While at Western Kentucky, he was an assistant coach. He went from Western to Clemson for three years as an assistant coach. Joel then went back into pro baseball as a manager for the Twins. He spent three years as field manager in the minor leagues, before going into the scouting department. Presently he is a territorial

scout covering the Mid- West area which includes lowa.

KEVIN ZIESMAN: Head Coach at Fort Dodge Community College (Iowa Central) for the past two years. Kevin came to Iowa Central from the University of Northern Iowa, where he served as an assistant coach. Prior to UNI, Kevin was an the Head baseball coach at West Hancock High School. Prior to this coaching job he served as an assistant coach at Waldorf College in Forest City. He has spoken at several camps on hitting.

MIKE ANDRESEN: lowa Cubs head groundskeeper. Mike has a tremendous background in field Maintenance. He graduated from Guthrie Center High School and went to Grand View Jr. College where he played baseball and got a degree in Commercial Horticulture. He went with a landscape Company, for a number of years before becoming Supt. of Grounds at Des Moines Area Community College. He has been the head groundskeeper at the Cubs for 3 1/2 years. This past year he was named American Association Groundkeeper of the Year.

UMPIRE SPEAKERS:

RICK ROEDER: graduated from Remsen St. Marys High School. He played baseball for the late Marv Thelen. Rick has attended umpire school and has gone back to teach in the Umpires school the past few years. Presently he is a triple A Umpire in the International League. He has umpired in the Rookie League, Midwest League, Southern League before being promoted to Triple A.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS: We would like for each committee member to check when his committee meeting will be held. It is important for the Chairman to take roll at this committee. Seven new members will be inducted into the Hall of Fame of the lowa High School Baseball Coaches Association at its annual clinic and awards banquet in Cedar Rapids, Saturday, February 12, 1994.

New inductees to be honored at the IHSBCA Twenty-Sixth Annual Clinic Banquet are: MIKE BODDICKER, Norway; BOB BURNS, Clinton; KEN CHARIPAR, Cedar Rapids; JIM DONO-HUE, Martensdale-St.Marys; ROGER HOEL, Waterloo; BRUCE KIMM, Norway; DUANE NEWTON, Zearing.

The seven names bring to 140 the number of Hall of Fame members. The honor roll now includes 87 coaches, 25 players, 22 umpires, and 6 Contributors.

MIKE BODDICKER: graduated from Norway High School in 1975. He took Norway to the state championship twice. Mike then attended the University of Iowa and pitched for Coach Banks for three years before signing a major league contract with Baltimore. He pitched in the All-Star Series and World Series with Baltimore and the Red Sox. He was traded to the Kansas City Royals in 1990. In 1993 he retired from baseball with the Milwaukee Brewers. Mike built quite a record in his 13 years of major league baseball. Starting in 1980 with Orioles, Mike won over 130 games while losing 85. He was in double figures in wins for 9 straight seasons, posting an average of 14.6 wins per year from 1983-93. Mike's second best year was in 1990 when he won 17 games for the Red Sox. In 1984, Mike won 20 games for Baltimore. Mike has struck out over 1,200 batters in his major league career. He is retired in Kansas City.

BOB BURNS: is the Fire Marshall for the City of Clinton and has continued to stay involved with baseball umpiring for 26 years. He has worked in ten All-Star Series, plus many state tournaments. Bob has been Southeast Iowa Umpire of the Year twice and was selected the 1986 State Umpire of the Year.

KEN CHARIPAR: graduated from Wilson High School, Cedar Rapids, and competed in baseball on the Wilson State Championship Baseball team 2 years (1947-48). He signed with the Chicago Cubs and played in the minor leagues after high school. Ken then coached and played amateur baseball in the M & J League, and around East Central lowa for more than 15 years. He started coaching the American Legion team in Cedar Rapids in the 60's as assistant coach and then was head coach in 1972 thru 1980. In 1981 he coached at the National Sports Festival in Syracuse, New York. He resumed coaching the Legion in 1982 through 1986. Presently he is an assistant coach at the University of Iowa, While coaching the Cedar Rapids Legion team he accomplished the following: Won the State Tournament 7 years, played in the Central Regional tournament 8 years, won the Central Plains Regional Tournament in 1974,75,76 and 86 to qualify for the American Legion World Series. In 1975 they were runner-ups to Yakima, WA. in the World Series. He has received numerous awards in baseball over his career.

JAMES DONOHUE: has coached baseball at Martensdale-St. Mary's for 20 years, during that time also serving as basketball coach for 13 years. During his 20 years at Martensdale-St. Mary's, Jim has compiled a record of 441-163; his teams have

made 4 state tournament appearances and been conference champions 15 years. Jim's honors have included: assistant and head coach of the Small West All-Star teams, S.W. District Coach of the Year four times, and speaker at the 1991 Bob Feller base-ball camp. In 1978, Jim formed and coached the St. Mary's semi-pro team; Jim has also conducted local baseball camps for Little Leaguers and spent countless hours developing the baseball facility at St. Mary's. In the IHSBCA, Jim has served in all association positions, the Board of Directors, Rating Poll Committee, Membership Committee, and the Vince Meyer Academic Committee.

ROGER HOEL: graduated from Charles City High School where he was a four-sport athlete. He attended Mason City Junior College where he played basketball and baseball and he received his BA and MA from University of Northern Iowa. While at UNI, he served as graduate assistant to the baseball coach. His high school coaching career spans 23 years and included stops at Oelwein, Waterloo Orange, Waterloo Central, and Waterloo West. His record included over 500 wins and 320 losses. His teams won two Big Eight Conference championships; they appeared in two state tournaments, winning the state championship in 1991. The 1991 season brought Hoel the N.E. Iowa District Coach of the Year and the State Coach of the Year awards. He has served on numerous committees in the association.

BRUCE KIMM: graduated from Norway High School in 1969. He attended the University of Iowa for one year. He signed a Major League contract with the Chicago White Sox in 1969. He was assigned to play in the minors until he made his major league debut in 1976 with the Detroit Tigers. He caught the "Bird" Fidrych for two years, before being traded to the Chicago Cubs in 1979. He went from the Cubs back to the White Sox. He played in 1986 major league games, having an life-time average of .237. At Norway, Bruce caught Dick McVay for four years. Norway went to the State tournament three straight years with Bruce catching and leading the team. He also helped take Norway to the first state basketball tournament. Since retiring from playing, Bruce has been a manager in the minor leagues with the Reds and then went to the big leagues as a third base coach with the Red's and the Padres. Presently he is the Triple A third base coach for the Atlanta Braves.

DUANE NEWTON: graduated from Rudd High School in 1949. He played four years of high school and in 1949 played in the state tournament. He played college ball at Iowa State Teacher College. As a senior he batted .421 and received honorable mention All-American honors. Duane played with a lot of town teams from 1945 thru 1968. He participated in several ABC state Tournaments with Allison, and played with Denver in the National ABC tournament. His coaching career started in 1955 when he started the baseball program at Cleghorn. He then coached at Zearing and NESCO. He coached through the lifetime of NESCO High School. During that time he won four sectional titles and seven conference titles. His over-all record is 304 wins and 315 losses. Currently he is Athletic Director at NESCO.



Minutes of Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association

Fall Meeting- - Iowa City Oct. 16, 1993

An umpire won't be recognized as a district nominee unless he is a member of the association for three consecutive years. The district nominees were presented to board. Lanny Peterson moved that the 1996 All-Star Series be played in Cedar Rapids. Terry Heald seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Father Collison moved Heller and Showalter nominated four year coaches, seconded by Terry Heald. Motion carried.

Rich Stoffers moved the format for the 1994 All-Star Series would include two games Thursday at 4 and 6, two games Friday at 2 and 4, two games Saturday at 3 and 5, and two games Sunday at 12 and 2 with a brunch Saturday at 10, seconded by Lanny Peterson. Motion carried.

Father Collison moved Lee Toole be contributor of the year. Jim Donohue seconded and the motion was carried.

Ev Petersen moved Bernie Saggau be named Presidential Award winner, seconded by Merle Olberding and the motion was carried.

Jim Mahoney recommended that the state be thanked for dealing with the rain hassles dealt with during the season and the tournaments.



SYNOPSIS OF THE MINUTES OF THE MEETING BASEBALL ADVISORY COMMITTEE OCTOBER 4, 1993

The Iowa High School Baseball Advisory Committee met in the Association Office, Boone, Iowa, Monday, October 4, 1993, 9:30 a.m. pursuant to notice. Members present were Dennis Olejniczak, Decorah, Jim Mahoney, Johnston, Eugene Meister, Algona, Garrigan, Bill Huisman, Centerville, Steve Pelzer, Massena, C & M, and Mel Murken, Ankeny. David Harty, Assistant Executive Director, of the IHSAA conducted the meeting.

The committee reviewed the pre-determined meeting agenda items previously sent to committee members. The following items were reviewed:

- 1). REVIEWED 1993 SEASON. Mr. Harty reviewed with members the 1993 summer season as it related to regular season contests and post-season tournament competition. It was explained the weather conditions of rain and flooding caused for many postponements and suspended games. Host school management, coaches, players, and fans were all very understanding of the many suspended and postponed games throughout the season, including tournament ball. Attending a high school baseball game appeared to be a good diversion for everyone experiencing frustrations and difficulties with the rains and flooding.
- 2). REVIEWED 4-A DISTRICT BASEBALL PAIRING PROCEDURE. The classification structure for summer baseball is: the largest 48 schools - 4-A; the next 64 largest 3-A; the next 128 - 2-A; balance - 1-A. The 4-A schools are paired with six teams to each eight districts thus requiring two byes in first round tournament play at the district level. nquiry has been made with reference to all six teams playing first round play on the opening Saturday date. One of the three winners would receive a bye in the second round, followed with the championship game in each of the eight districts. Briefly, it amounts to all six teams playing on Saturday with everyone being able to use their number one pitcher. Two teams play the following Monday, both throwing their second pitcher. One team would receive a bye. The remaining teams play on Wednesday, permitting the throwing of the number one pitcher again. The rationale being greater equity would surface as it relates to the competing teams' pitching rotations. It was pointed out in the current format the two teams receiving the byes in first round play are saving their number one pitcher to pitch against their opponent's second pitcher in the semifinal play. This would alleviate that concern. There are no first-round byes in Classes 2-A and 3-A. There is only one game in first-round 1-A play thus only 4-A would be affected by the pairing change in format.

Discussion also centered around the possibility of seeding at the 4-A district level, similar to the seeding procedure used in basketball with a cutoff date. Discussion centered around the difficulties encountered with the seeding procedure, specifically that of the mechanics of accomplishing a seeding format during the summer when communications are quite difficult. It was pointed out that seeding procedures in basketball is not without its problems. However, that is done during the course of the school year at a time when the mechanics can more easily be determined. Discussion followed.

- 3). REVIEWED PLACEMENT OF A WARNING TRACK ALONG THE OUTFIELD FENCES.
- 4). REVIEWED 20-PLAYER SQUAD LIMITATION FOR TOURNAMENT PLAY.
- 5). REVIEWED NUMBER OF UMPIRES USED IN DISTRICT FINAL PLAY. In class 4-A the district final is now the same as the previous year's first round substate games. Three umpires are assigned substate play.
- 6). REVIEWED STATE TOURNAMENT SERIES SITE SELECTION POSSIBLY CONSIDERING A COLLEGE OR PROFESSIONAL PARK.
- 7). DISCUSSED ADDITIONAL TEAMS QUALIFYING FOR STATE TOURNAMENT PLAY,
- 8). DISSEMINATED 1994 MAJOR BASEBALL RULE CHANGES.
- 9). REVIEWED PLAYER/COACH EJECTION REPORT AND SPORTSMAN-HIP RATINGS OF MEMBER BASEBALL SCHOOLS. In review of the player ejection report, it was pointed out that 108 ejections took place during the 1993 summer season as compared to 155 during the 1992 season, a 30% decrease. The Committee was pleased with the results. A great deal of emphasis was given to the matter at the rules meetings and in correspondence to umpires and coaches last spring. Coaches are to be commended for their leadership in this very important area of interscholastic athletics. The Committee expressed their appreciation for the remarkable improvement and the desire for continued efforts by coaches taking a pro-active posture in the elimination of poor conduct.

- 10. SPORTSMANSHIP RATINGS. The all school sportsmanship ratings for summer baseball were reviewed by the committee. This was the first year for rating the baseball schools. Football, basketball, and wrestling schools have been rated for the past five or six years. Schools are rated on 1-5 rating scale, 1-superior, 2-above average, 3-average, 4-below average, and 5-unsatisfactory. The 1993 state average for baseball in each category is coach-1.58; players-1.60; and spectators-1.73. In that the baseball schools have not previously been rated in sportsmanship ratings as far as the coach, players, and spectators are concerned, it is not possible to compare with prior years, other than to state as an advisory committee the 1993 state average in each category for baseball is excellent. A summary of all schools' sportsmanship ratings in baseball can be found in the HISAA October Bulletin, 1993, pages 13-16.
- 11). REVIEWED THE USE OF THE NEW LINEUP CARDS, recognizing many coaches used the older card inventory up this past summer and will now have only the newly revised lineup cards, felt to be very useful by the coaching staff.
- 12). REVIEWED SPRING SPORTS MANUAL.
- 13). REVIEWED NEW CAMP/CLINIC REGULATIONS, COACHING RULE, AND NON-SCHOOL TEAM PARTICIPATION RULE.
- 14). REVIEWED STATE BASEBALL TOURNAMENT, AND PICTURE REQUEST FOR STATE BASEBALL TOURNAMENT PROGRAM.
- 15). REVIEWED THE PROBABILITY OF NOTIFYING THE HISAA OFFICE AS WELL AS THE ASSOCIATED PRESS AND DES MOINES REGISTER OF RESULTS FROM FIRST LEVEL TOURNAMENT PLAY THROUGH SUBSTATES.
 16). REVIEWED POSSIBILITY OF VIDEO TAPING THE STATE TOURNAMENT GAMES, MUCH AS IS THE CASE IN STATE BASKETBALL FOR RESALE TO THE SCHOOLS INVOLVED IN THE STATE TOURNAMENT.

17). REVIEWED MEDIA AREA FOR PHOTOGRAPHERS

RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations are made, resulting from the above discussions.

- In 4-A districts play all six teams on the opening day (Saturday) with a pre-determined bye in second-round play.
- 2. In the interest of safety when construction or renovation takes place on playing facilities member schools consider a warning track.
- 3. Respectfully request a review of the squad limits for tournament play, currently permitting 20 players in uniform.
- Respectfully request consideration to Sec Taylor stadium as a possibility for future state tournament play.
- 5. Recommend eight qualifying teams to the state tournament play.
- 6. Manual changes
 - A. As a part of the pitching limitation rule, stipulate in the manual that one pitch constitutes an inning having been pitched.
 - B. Page 49 of the manual, strike item #14, and give emphasis to some as it relates to malicious contact at rules meetings and in correspondence to umpires and coaches.
- 7. Recommend considering video taping each of the 12 state tournament games.
- 8. Place emphasis on media box for photography during regular season and tournament play.

1992-93 BASEBALL PLAYER EJECTION REPORT
PENALTY: Any student disqualified from an interscholastic contest by game officials for flagrant, violent or verbal misconduct will be ineligible for the next regularity scheduled game/meet at that level of competition and all other games/meets in the interim at any level in addition to any other penalties the IHSAA or the school may assess

The second violation carries a four (4) *regularly scheduled game/meet ineligibility.

in penalty is carried over in that particular sport season and no contest remains, the penalty is carried over in that particular sport until the next school year. The penalty is not imposed from one sport program to the next sport program. Exception: If a senior (12th grade) athlete is ejected from the last contest of the season in a given sport, the penalty is carried over to the next sport program the athlete participates in. If penalties are imposed at the end of the sport season and no contest remains, the

Any school that does not enforce this policy will be placed on probation and will not be permitted to participate in any IHSAA-sponsored events for one calendar year.

*The "next regularly scheduled game/meet" is defined as the next scheduled, rescheduled, or contracted date. Example: "A1 is ejected from the first game of a double-header baseball game. What is the penalty for A1?" Ruling—A1 must sit out the second game of the double-header and is suspended from the next scheduled date at that level of competition and all games in the interim at any level. This ruling would also apply to double-dual or dual team wrestling meets and junior varsity/varsity football or basketball double-headers, as well as any other sport sanctioned by the IHSAA.

Anytime a student-athlete is ejected from a game/meet, he/she does not participate the remainder of that day. The student is also suspended from the next scheduled, rescheduled, or contracted date at that level of competition and all games/meets in the interim at other levels of competition.

There were 108 ejections, grades 7-12 during the 1992-93 baseball season. The following charts will give you information relative to the ejections during the 1992-93 baseball season

The IHSAA sent 13 reprimand letters to officials for not reporting an ejection. This information has been compiled from the schools' and officials' reports during the 1992-93 baseball season.

REPORT ON SUMMER BASEBALL TOURNAMENT SERIES, RAT-INGS AND EJECTION REPORT. Mr. Harty reviewed with members the district. substate, and state baseball tournament series. It was pointed out that in spite of the inclement weather the state baseball tournament started on schedule Thursday, July 29, 1993, however the finals postponed Saturday, July 31, to Monday, August 2, for completion. It was pointed out that there were many postponements, rescheduling of games, movement of sites, and rescheduling of umpire assignments throughout district and substate play. Most notably was the super cooperation and help from the membership in conducting the games, rescheduling, and change of site locations. The schools, coaches and umpires were very understanding and cooperative in the many schedule changes that were necessary to complete district and substate play,

Following review of the 1993 summer baseball tournament series, direction was given to the 1993 baseball sportsmanship ratings for the member schools, coaches, players, and spectators. Members were informed that ratings will be sent to the membership Friday, August 13, 1993. This is the first year of rating baseball, whereas, football, basketball, and wrestling have been rated in the past. The Board and Council passed a ruling that a school must have eight (8) ratings or more in all categories before they would be listed in the IHSAA Bulletin. The rating scale is as follows: 1 - Superior, 2 - Above average, 3 - Average, 4 below average; and 5 unsatisfactory. The 1992-93 state average for baseball in each category is: Coach - 1.58; Players - 1.60; Spectators - 1.73. That is a record that all can be proud as it relates to the first year's ratings of the member baseball schools. Member schools are encouraged to use the rating information in a positive manner to improve the interscholastic program.

1992-93 BASEBALL PLAYER EJECTION REPORT

It was pointed out that there were 108 ejections in grades 7-12 during the 1992-93 baseball season. Player ejections were as follows: Junior high = 1; 9th grade = 4; junior varsity = 13; sophomore - 6; and varsity - 84. There were 47 fewer ejections in 1993 than 1992 - a 30% decrease.


There were 16 coach ejections, grades 7-12, during the 1992-93 baseball season.

Coach ejections were as follows: Varsity - 10; assistant varsity - 4; junior varsity - 1; sophomore 1; and none in the 9th grade. Thirteen (13) of these ejections were for arguing judgment/verbal misconduct and three (3) were for profamily.

Members were particularly pleased with the considerable reduction in ejections due to use of profanity and flagrant conduct. A considerably greater number of second and third notices are sent to schools not reporting an ejection than in other sport programs. This number is largely due to the fact that baseball is a summer program and schools are not in session, thus, communication is not as good as it is during the academic school year. It was also reported that seven (7) players will miss the first game of the 1994 season.

Pitcher: Break toward plate after delivering the ball.

Catcher; Field all bunts possible; call the play; cover 3rd base when 3rd baseman fields the bunt in close to Home plate.

lst Baseman: Cover the area between 1st and the wound.

2nd Baseman: Cover 1st base...cheat by shortening position.

Shortstop: Cover 2nd base,

3rd Baseman: Cover the area between 3rd and the mound.


Left Fielder: Hove in toward 2nd base area.

Center Fielder: Back up 2nd base.

Right Fielder: Back up lat base.

Break toward 3rd base line upon delivering the ball.

Center Fielder: Back up 2nd base.

First objective is to retire the runner at 3rd, but one runner <u>MUST</u> be retired.
