Maintenance of Baseball Playing Fields

As Coach Danny Litwheler and Coach Cap Finn once stated - All people connected with baseball will agree that the game is much more satisfactory to players, coaches and spectators when the facilities are the best or as good as possible. Players perform better on a good diamond and spectators watch with greater understanding and comfort when facilities are well planned.

The opposite side of the coin gives us a reverse picture. All coaches have seen infielders play "scared" and become "gun shy" on a rough field. When the players make snide remarks such as "What a Rock Pile-Sand Pit-Ploughed Field-Pavement or Obstacle Course - it is a good bet that the playing will be second rate. The following notes I sincerely hope will help you in maintaining a better playing field for the players and a beautiful one from a spectator stand point. In order to have a good playing field we must have a top grade dedicated maintenance and this boils down to the MAN in magagement. Where else could you find a more dedicated man as one in yourself "The Groundskeeper".

Helpful Hints For Baseball Playing Fields:

A. Skinned Infield Area:

If possible rebuild your infield in the fall after your season is over. At this time the grass edge of the infield should be edged or if necessary due to a soil build up along all edges they should now be corrected. If edging does not do the job use a sod cutter to remove the sod along the edge, followed by grading the area and re-sod this area. The grass edge and infield soil edge should be even. There should be no high or low spots. A gradual fall should start from the pitchers mound grass outline across the infield grass-infield skinned area onto the outfield grass. A normal fall is four inches on the infield grass, another four on the infield skinned area, then one inch to every 20 feet on the outfield area. When re-sodding make your base lines say four feet instead of six feet. Your baseline edge from 1st to 2nd to 3rd - eighteen inches instead of thirty-six inches. By doing this one can edge these areas as needed in order to keep a razor sharp grass outline and eventually you will be up to the distance prescribed-rather than have a ragged outline or one that is too large. If you get an edge built up it will be only necessary to edge a couple inches off without losing too much grass. On what type of soil makes the best infield? Well, I do not believe if one checked all major league infields one will not find two alike. It all boils down to the MAN in Management. It is impossible to determine an exact formula to fit different soils in all areas of the country. After checking many in-

This type of drag can be made and does an excellent job for smoothing out the soil - it helps to knock down the high spots

and fills in the low spots. After the area is leveled off to your safisfaction add your top dressing of sand, calcined clay or a combination of both, followed by nail dragging lightly and the final leveling process of dragging a steel door mat drag. Larger types of compact tractor or larger type tractor drags can be made from lumber type and does a good leveling job.

Take 2-4"x4" 8' long and space them six feet apart. Nail a 2"x6"x6' on top, one on each end and one in the middle. Tie a heavy duty rope or chain to each end adjusting the rope on chain

to what pressure it takes to lavel off. This type drag can be used at various times throughout the year - especial y the day after a game has been played in wet conditions. Another type of drag can be made out of four two x tens x eight to ten feet long. Nail each board on top of each other four to six inches from the end in a ripple like effect. This type of drag is very effective in pulverizing clumps of soil that have become hard and it does an excellent job on a skinned area that has had a football game played on. If the infield in re-building needs rolling do not use a large asphalt type of roller. Start off by using a small water filled hand roller to build up your infield desired compaction. Before the season starts try to have a stock pile of infield soil, sand and calcined clay on hand. Infield daily care starts after the ball game. One half hour of work after the game is a very cheap insurance policy. As one removes the bases take a rake along and rake out the hump that has built up under the base during the game-rake lightly around the base. At second base after removing the built up hump, go toward the left field backside of the base a few feet and pull a little soil toward first base. This is soil that was pushed there by players sliding into second base. The same at third base. After this is done drag the entire skinned area and in case of rain your infield is leveled off and there will be no areas for rain water to puddle. If you tractor drag your infield try to stay a foot or so away from the grass edge and after dragging finish this area by hand dragging followed by taking a corn broom and sweep the grassedge. This extra five minutes will prevent a soil build up on the grass. Many soil build ups are due to lazyness and very sloppy tractor dragging of the infield area. The groundskeeper is to be blamed for built up grass edges due to dragging. Here is a typical non-machine operated infield program for a four-thirty work out for a seven-thirty game. At noon water down infield skinned area-men do other chores between drying time. Two mer nail drag infield at one o'clock from the direction of foul line to foul line. This takes fifteen minutes to do. Other chores to be done:

at one forty-five men door mat drag the infield, at two clock the infield is wet gain - other chores to be done - At three o'clock the infield is mail dragged, in-eld grass to outfield grass - at three forty the infield is door matted from foul line to foul line - followed by setting in the bases and cages - infield is wet down lightly at four o'clock and it is now ready for a 4:30 work out. Infields should be hand or mechanically scarified each playing day lightly to give the infield the needed cushion. The same operation as the hand operation can be done with a tractor and drag. Do not scarify when the soil is too wet, let it dry until it is workable. Do not finish door mat dragging when it is too damp or too dry. Try for the in between. If at all possible after each door mat dragging operation try to corn broom sweep the grass edge to prevent the soil build up. In areas where the wind blows causing a soil edge build up hose down the edge under heavy water pressure when the team is on the road.

Rain:

Always have sand and calcined clay on hand. If one does not have a field cover this is your ace in the hole. If you have an early rain (and the field is wet) as soon as one can get on it, hand rake or nail drag the area. Sun and wind will dry it up with the help of the loosening of the soil. If time is not available top dress the akinned area with sand or calcined clay. Sometimes one can use a fertilizer spreader. If not, top dress with a shovel followed by running a leaf rake or a heavy duty bristle street broom over this area. Remember, if you do as good job of daily dragging you will have no puddle and without puddles your chances of getting the game in are higher. The rext day hand rake or vail drag the area to work in the excess sand or calcined clay. Some groundskeepers incorporate calcined clay to a depth of six to eight inches. I do not. I incorporate my calcined clay into the top two inches followed by weekly top dressing of either sand or calcined clay.

B. Fitchers Mound:

The mound should be built or rebuilt after the season or in early spring. Follow the rule book in building of the mound. The rubber should be ten inches above home plate and the slope is one inch per foot. The same soil can be used to build the mound as the infield except one area six inches wide and sixty inches long in front of the rubber – and another area about five feet in front of the rubber four feet square should have pure clay or the best clay available in your area. The top of rubber area is what we call a rathe, \(\chi_{180}\)

This table is level followed by a slope to the mound contour to the grass. This table helps the pitcher. He is standing on a level plane - otherwise he has to step up to the rubber after each pitch which is tiresome. Daily care of the mound is very important. Always keep a stock pile of clay on hand and keep some damp under a burlap Try to keep the clay around golf ball size. After each game take a stiff broom and sweep the hole area down to the hard surface. Wet the hole with water to dampen the area for bonding. Place the fresh damp clay in the hole and tamp rigorously with a hand tamp. If clay sticks to the tamp, top dress some dry soil on the clay or cover the tamp with burlap. Hand rake the entire area. Steel door mat the area followed by rolling if necessary. The mound can be top dressed with sand or calcined clay to prevent the soil from sticking to the players cleats. Always try to keep your table level. To keep your slope make a check board by using a 2"x4"x10" long - place the board on the rubber - place a level on top of the board - when the board is level nail a 1"x6" on the home plate side. The 2x4 will now stand by itself. From a point six inches in front of the rubber make a mark followed by a mark at each foot to six foot. From the bottom of the 2x4 at mark one there should be a one inch clearance. At mark four there should be a four inch clearance. Use this check board each week to check your slope. It will save you time and you will always have the proper slope. Daily re-claying only takes around 30 minutes and one will always have a good mound.

C. Home Plate:

Home plate can be made out of the same type of infield soil with the exception of the batters box. Lay age the batters and carchers box. In this area remove three to four inches of soil and replace with the best available clay. Pack the clay in by using a hand tamper or by tire rolling it in using a tractor or even a car going back and forth over the area to be packed with the wheels. Try to keep home plate about two inches above the grass line for drainage. Also try to keep the grass line as small as possible. Try to start out with a ten foot radius. To keep home plate true and level use a 2x4x14 long placing one edge on the plate the other a few feet on the grass. Press down hard and pull the 2x4 clockwise then counter clockwise. This will give one a level home plate. Again in case of rain - no puddles - Do this weekly as a level check point. Daily care is to sweep all holes down to the hard surface. Dampen the holes with water - apply damp clay - tamp in rigorously - hand rake - steel door mat drag - roll if necessary. Before a game take a sprinkling can and sprinkle the batters box area lightly followed by raking in the loose soil and tamp - hand rake - steel door mat drag - hand roll place in batters box. take some water-cleanser and a stiff scrub brush and wash home plate rubber.

Foul lines:

Straight, sharp lines dress up the playing field. Commercial line markers are on the market today. If you wish to make one with two pieces of 1"x6"x12 ft. long for the slanted sides, and have a wedge at each end six inches alloss the top and 3 to 4 inches at the bottom. A cleat across the center will act as a handle. After setting the chalk line, place the 12 ft. trough over the line. By using a large juice can with boles punched in the bottom and by placing a few nuts and bolts inside with the line marking material shake the can and put down as much material as you wish. In the outfield set your foul line string and paint a three to four inch line with Sodium Arsenate. After a few days remove the dead grass. Paint this area with a cheap outside white paint. Or if sodium arsenate is not available use a mixture of gas and diesel fuel. If one wishes to use a wet solution one can use a two or three gallon hand pump garden type sprayer to paint in the lines. The hand sprayers do an excellent job.

Turf grasses:

A well managed and manicured turf adds to a first class field. It is a pleasure to play on and a pleasure to look at from a fans stand point. Grass is very important. The more you have the less mud you have. Usually people expect too much from natural grass and in return give it too little. Building of a field is very important from a osition of soil drainage and type of grasses to be used. When building a field check with your nearest State University turf department for the above information. On established fields depending where you are located we have what we call cool season and warm season grasses. On cool season grasses the hest time to establish this type is in early fall. If all possible as soon as the season is over your turf program should be in full swing. The fall is mother natures time for good furf. During the season have your soil checked out for soil nutrients and see if time is needed. Your local county agricultural exent can do this for you. Equipment teamssaty for your renovation program may be hard to some by. Again check with the friends of turf for equipment available such as your Parks and Recreation System. Your local golf courses and equipment rental agency. After the season is over the grass area should be aerified a number of times followed by fertilizing, liming if needed and seeding. many good seeders on the market. I like to use the Rodgers Aero Black Seeder, one that drills the seed into the ground. When seeding with cool season grasses use a good mixture. Check with your local county ag. agent. I recommend always on using a blend. had use a blend of bluegrass, fine leaf fiscues and rive grasses. A blend of the new low growing bluegrasses is excellent. The new fine leader the grasses make excellent If your field has many weeds start your program as is in August and use the many weed killers on the marker relay to rid your turf of

There are good pre- and post emergency crab grass killers. Grass is a very important part of the game, and needs a good management program to help it along. After aerification, fertilizing, liming seeding keep the area moist but not saturated until the grass seed has germinated and is on its way. If one has to seed in the early spring add more of the fine leafed rye grasses to your mixture for fast germination. care is very important. Grass should be mowed as needed not by a schedule. There is only one rule for mowing grass. Mow the turf when needed and the rule for this is to remove only one-fourth of the height of cut at each mowing. Rule two is if you don't have time to check the sharpness of the blade you don't have time to mow. On cool season grasses never mow below one and one-half inches unless the grass is one of the new low growing strains. A dull blade injures the blade of grass making it vulnerable to diseases and insect attack, plus weakening the plant. Watering the turf is very important. Again water the turf as needed and watering can be done at any time of the day. A sure sign of turf needing water is by foot prints on the grass not bouncing back, grass has a bluish wilting look. Aerification during the season helps for better water penetration and also helps your surface drainage to get the water to the roots and off the surface plus eliminates compaction. On our warm season grasses such as our Bermuda, fertilization is best applied during the greening up and growing season. On mowing of Bermuda do not mow higher than one inch. There are many new strains of Bermuda on the market today. A good, well-groomed, natural grass field is 100% bette than a million dollar artificial surface.

Equipment:

On the purchase of mechanical equipment try to make the piece of machinery do many jobs for you such as in infield care, turf care and utilize the many attachments that come with the equipment. Many times you can make your own field equipment such as infield drags, straight edges. Keep in close contact with your city parks and recreation system. Your golf courses and equipment rental firms. I believe every groundskeeper should have on hand a book by Prentice-Hall, Inc. called <u>Jack Coombs Baseball</u>, 4th edition Revised by Danny Litwhiler, head baseball coach M.S.U. CONSTITUTION OF THE IOWA HIGH SCHOOL BASEBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION

Article I - Name

The name of this organization shall be the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches Association, organized as a non-profit voluntary organization.

Article II — Purpose

- 1. To promote cooperation and understanding between the administration, teachers, coaches and the community concerning the place of baseball in the total education program.
 - 2. To promote pure, wholesome, amateur inter-scholastic baseball.
- 3. To help instruct and maintain the highest possible standards in inter-scholastic baseball and the baseball coaching profession.
- 4. To secure a better understanding of inter-scholastic baseball by sharing mutual coaching problems and practices.
- 5. To have a representative group of coaches interested in fostering a close working relationship with the Iowa High School Athletic Association, schools, colleges, and professional organizations.
 - 6. To develop and promote greater unity, uniformity, and fellowship among all members and players.

Article III — Membership

- Section 1. There shall be three classes of membership in this association; active, associate and honorary.
- Section 2. Active membership shall include all actively engaged baseball coaches of secondary schools, and they shall be the only voting body.
- Section 3. Associate membership shall include all interested supporters of secondary school baseball programs and not actively engaged in coaching secondary inter-scholastic baseball.
- **Section 4.** Honorary membership shall be elected to the membership at the pleasure of the Executive Committee upon two-thirds vote.
 - Section 5. Membership shall extend from September 1 to September 1 of the following year.

Article IV - Dues

- Section 1. The annual active membership fee shall be \$5.00 for head coaches and assistant coaches.
- Section 2. The annual associate membership fee shall be \$5.00.
- Section 3. No fee for honorary membership.

Article V — Officers and Board of Directors

- **Section 1. Officers.** The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Executive Secretary. Only active members of the Association shall hold office.
- Section 2. Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall consist of ten members, two (2) representatives from each of the five Iowa High School Athletic Association Districts.
- Section 3. Past Presidents. The past presidents of the Association shall be members of the Board of Directors. They shall be the Steering Committee.

Article VI — Elections and Terms of Office

- **Section 1. Officers.** (A) Candidates for each of the four offices shall be nominated by a nomination committee of the Board of Directors at the late-winter annual clinic meeting. In the normal course of events the Vice-President shall succeed the retiring President, the Treasurer shall succeed the retiring Vice-President, the Secretary shall succeed the retiring Treasurer, and a new Secretary will be elected. An election shall then be held at the clinic meeting by the members present.
- (B) Elected officers shall take office upon duly being elected. Term of office shall be one year. Officers shall be eligible for re-election.
- Section 2. Board of Directors. (A) The representatives to the Board of Directors shall be elected by the members within their district. Each representative board member will be elected for a period of two years with one-half of the representative board members being elected each year. In each election the person receiving the second highest number of votes will become the alternate. By October 15 of each year, the association members will receive an official blank nomination ballot. Upon voting, the nomination ballot to be returned (within ten days from mailing) to the executive secretary. In the presence of two other association members, there shall be a canvass of the ballots. The 3 receiving the highest number of votes shall be considered the nominees. In case of a tie of more than 3, all those in the ties shall be considered nominees. In case the number of nomination ballots for any one of the nominees is a majority of the number of members in the respective district, he shall be declared elected. The executive secretary shall prepare and mail official election ballots to the members of the district. Upon voting, the election ballot to be returned (within ten days from mailing) to the executive secretary. The procedure in canvassing shall be the same as in canvassing nomination ballots and the person receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. In case of a tie, the election shall be decided by lot by the candidates in the presence of the canvassing committee. The second highest vote getter shall be considered the alternate and in event of inability of elected Director to serve, alternate will be appointed to the Board of Directors.

(B) Elected Board of Directors shall take office at the late-winter annual clinic meeting.

(C) The Board of Directors shall appoint an Executive Secretary. The Executive Secretary shall be paid a fee. Only active members of the Association shall be eligible to be appointed as Executive Secretary. He shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years and be eligible for re-appointment by the Board of Directors.

Article VII — Duties of the Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall have the power to appoint all committees and officers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution. He shall keep on file and transmit to the next president his records, and shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

Section 2. Vice-President. The Vice-President shall assume the duties of the President in his inability to act.

He shall assist all standing committee chairmen.

Section 3. Secretary. The Secretary shall be the chief officer responsible for all such records and proceedings of the association meetings. He shall read all minutes of the previous meetings. He shall keep up-to-date records of the meetings and keep on file and transmit to the next secretary his records. He shall conduct meetings in case of absence of the President and Vice-President.

Section 4. Treasurer. The Treasurer shall be the chief financial officer responsible for receipt and disbursement of funds as authorized by the Executive Committee. Accurate records are to be kept subject to annual audit by the Auditing Committee. A financial report shall be given as routine order of business at all regular meetings. He

shall conduct meetings in the Ebsence of the President, Vice-President, and Secretary.

Section 5. Executive Secretary. The Executive Secretary shall be responsible for the publication and distribution of nomination ballots and the election ballots, the publication and the distribution of the NEWSLETTER and other materials that may be authorized by the Executive Committee. He shall attend all Board meetings and Executive meetings and make reports to the same when asked to do so. He shall carry on the day to day operation of the Association.

Article VIII — Executive Committee

Section 1. Membership. The Executive Committee shall be composed of all duly elected and appointed officers and board members specified in Article VI, each having one vote on all legislative matters.

Section 2. Legislative Action. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for proper management of the affairs of the Association and shall act on all matters pertaining to membership and legislation in accordance with the Constitution.

Section 3. Quorum. A quorum shall consist of the membership of the Executive Committee present and any action taken shall be based on simple majority vote.

Article IX — Meetings

Section 1. Regular. To be decided by the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Quorum. A quorum shall consist of the active members present, due notice having been given of the meeting.

Article X — Committees

Section 1. Standing Committees. The standing committees shall consist of: Membership, Program, Auditing, and Public Relations.

Section 2. The functions, organization, and methods of procedure of the various committees are to be set

forth in their respective operating codes.

Section 3. The President shall appoint a chairman for each of the standing committees and they shall terminate with his administration in office.

Article XI — Publications

Section 1. The official publication shall be the Iowa High School Baseball Coaches' Association NEWS-LETTER.

Section 2. The distribution and publication of other materials may be authorized by the Executive Committee.

Article XII — Amendments

Section 1. An amendment to this constitution may be proposed by the Executive Committee or by written petition of ten (10) active members to the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Proposed amendments or changes must appear in the NEWSLETTER prior to the time of any regular meeting.

Section 3. An affirmative vote equivalent to wo-thirds of the active membership at a regular meeting shall be necessary for the adoption of the amendment.






