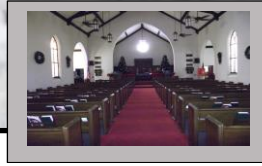

First Things First...

This I Believe

“...in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you, yet do it with gentleness and respect.”

1 Peter 3:15

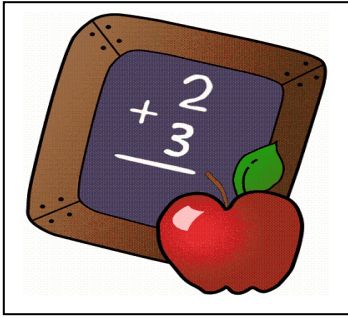
Belief exerts a powerful influence on every aspect of life. As Peter says above, there is a hope in everyone who believes in Christ the Lord. Each one of us should be ready, at any time, to make a defense (tell the reason) for that hope. In the series of statements which began in the February edition of *First Fruits*, I plan to share a summary of what I believe so that you may know me more fully and so you may see the reason for the hope that is in me. I continue the series with this article stating my belief regarding the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

It is fitting and appropriate to begin this article with a reminder that on November 26 we celebrate Thanksgiving Day. It is fitting and appropriate because one of the names of the Sacrament we examine this month is The Thanksgiving. In Greek that word is “eucharisto” which transliterates to “eucharist,” one of the names given the Supper. Other names include: The Lord’s Supper, The Lord’s Table, The Thanksgiving, The Eucharist: all refer to the same meal which is also called Communion or Holy Communion.

I believe the Scriptures plainly teach (and therefore I believe) that in Holy Communion the Real Presence of the Body and Blood of Christ exists in the Sacrament. In the same manner as when Jesus spoke to His disciples in the upper room on the night of His betrayal, when He said to them, “...this is My body, ...this is My blood,” His body and blood are received in the same way: in, with and under the bread and the wine or grape juice (literally *the fruit of the vine*). As presented in the articles on Baptism, Holy Communion likewise communicates forgiveness, delivers from death and the devil and gives the believing recipient everlasting life. This is clearly portrayed through Christ’s own words, saying that as His body and blood are received in the Sacrament, it is “for the forgiveness of sins”. Participation in this Sacrament occurs regularly and repeatedly because Scripture instructs us to “do this, whenever you drink it.” Preparation to receive this Sacrament is commanded by the Word in 1 Corinthians 11:23-32. The recipient is exhorted to “examine” oneself to “recognize the body of the Lord.” I believe this means to recognize one’s need for Christ’s forgiving sacrifice and to believe Christ’s words saying His body and blood are given for the forgiveness of sins.

The communicant need not have concern regarding the “worthiness” or “unworthiness” of any other person coming to the altar in order to partake of the Sacrament. One should concentrate on the beneficial gift of forgiveness which Christ earned and the impartation of that gift to one’s

First School And Day Care

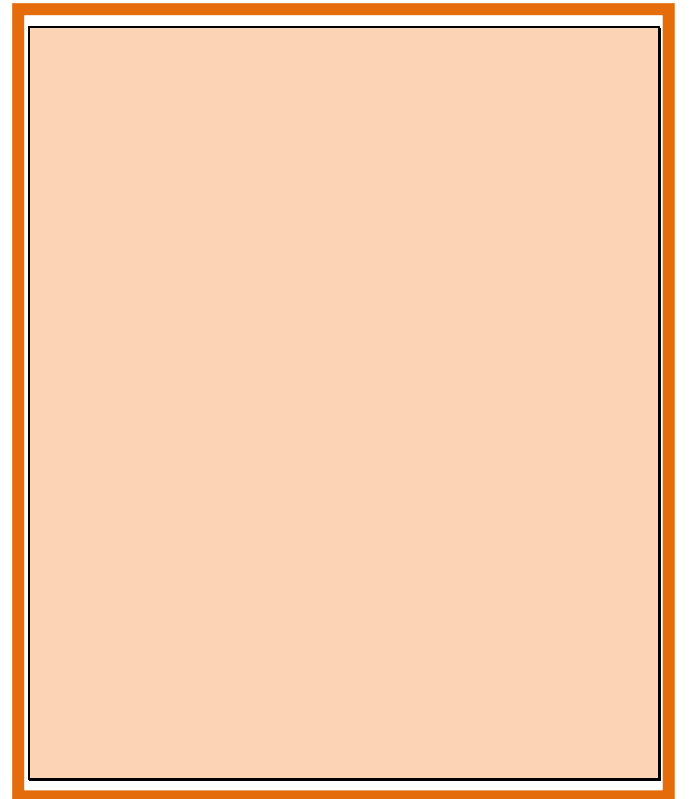

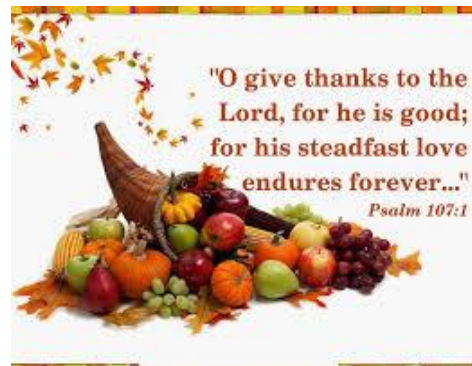

believing heart. What should one do if he or she does not feel worthy to receive the Sacrament because of unconfessed sin or an unresolved offense in a relationship? In that case, I would remind that person that it is for those very sins (and for every sin) that Christ died. He instituted the Meal for the assurance that sins are forgiven. If one's conscience is stricken and fearful because of some sin and they have such an awareness of guilt so they self-prevent partaking in the Sacrament, that person should be dealt a hearty dose of the Gospel for its absolution. A Christian should feel comfortable approaching the congregation's pastor or another mature member for counsel and verbal assurance of God's willingness to forgive and restore. The Lord is anxious to forgive and offers the Eucharist that every sinner may receive the assurance that his or her sins are forgiven. What if one does not "feel" the need for Communion? How often should one partake of the Supper? I believe both of these questions find an answer in Martin Luther's response to the first question. In essence he said, "Put your hand inside your shirt and touch your chest. If you find mortal flesh with that touch, then you have need of the Sacrament." To neglect the Lord's Table is to forego the generous blessing the Lord offers in it. One's sense of the Lord's Presence and His offered forgiveness should prompt attendance at His Table as often as possible.

What of the case where one disciple of Christ sees someone partaking of the Table who is living a life that is openly sinful or uncharacteristic of a believer? Then, follow the direction of Galatians 6:1, "*Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness. Keep watch on yourself, lest you too be tempted.*" Also, in Matthew 16:18, we read: *If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, **between you and him alone** (emphasis mine). If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge maybe established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church. And if he refuses to listen to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector.* Always, we should strive for the reconciliation of ourselves and our brothers and sisters in Christ that we may come to the Holy Supper rejoicing in the Communion with Jesus and each other.

I believe this is most certainly true. Pastor Grier
