MINISTER'S CORNER

Dear Friends:

A man named Vincent shared the following story.

“A jumbled roll of barbed wire that I saw while hiking last summer reminded me of something that happened to my brother-in-law. Several years ago, Jerry was leading his horse through a pasture. The horse stepped into some unseen barbed wire and got tangled in it. The more it struggled to get free, the more ensnared it became. Jerry tried to calm the horse and unravel the wirey mess, but the animal resisted his every attempt. The horse reared and struggled, the flesh was cut deeply, and the blood streamed down its legs. It wasn't until the horse collapsed in exhaustion that Jerry could free it and tend its many wounds.

“This story reminds me of how I get myself tangled up in bad situations. Resisting God's help, I struggle and struggle on my own to get free, but most times it only makes my problem worse. I often get hurt and collapse from emotional exhaustion before I remember that God is there, trying to get me out of the tangle. Once I calm down and turn to God, I realize that I don't have to do it alone. So often I ignore the Lord as a powerful advocate who is always available to me. When will I learn?”

This year the Lenten season begins on February 26th (Ash Wednesday). Some individuals don't really care for Lent. I have heard people say that it's too somber for them and brings them down. They wonder, “Why do we need to think about the cross? Why can't we just skip over that gloomy part and get right to Easter?”

My response is that Lent is an important reminder to us. It reminds us that, figuratively speaking, we all step into a roll of barbed wire at times and get ourselves tangled up; and when we struggle to get out of that wirey mess on our own, we only end up becoming more and more ensnared. The Lenten season also reminds us that God sent Christ to help us escape from the spiritual entanglements we find ourselves in and tend to our many wounds.

As somber as Lent might be, it also assures us that we are never alone in our toils and troubles. Jesus came into the world to reveal God's love—a love that was expressed most powerfully when he was crucified and died on Golgotha. And the gates of eternal life were opened to us through Jesus' resurrection. But you can't have the empty tomb without Golgotha. We have to go through Lent and the cross before we can get to Easter and the resurrection.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent, is on February 26th. If you would like to receive ashes there will be two opportunities to do so. Pastor Gagnon will be in the sanctuary from 1 to 2:30 p.m. and 6 to 7 p.m. A self-guided devotion booklet will be available for any who wish to use it to help focus on the meaning of the Lenten season. Those who wish to simply stop by the sanctuary, receive ashes and leave are welcome to do so. Pastor Gagnon will also be available to offer individual prayers or just to talk.

FCC SCARBOROUGH'S CHURCH'S INCLEMENT WEATHER POLICY

We all know that Maine winters are unpredictable and can be treacherous. So, if there is a significant storm on Saturday night or it is storming on Sunday morning, make sure you check to make sure the service hasn't been cancelled before venturing out. Cancellation notices will be posted on our church's website, at **fccscarborough.com**. Also, the First Congregational Church of Scarborough is now registered with **WCSH and WGME TV**, and a cancellation announcement will run on both of those stations as early in the morning as possible. Finally, you can call the office at **883-2342**. Pastor Gagnon will leave a message on the answering machine by 7:30 a.m. if the service has been cancelled. If the answering machine message hasn't been changed, it means there will be a service of some kind (although it may be an abbreviated one). Please use discretion in deciding whether to come to church in bad weather. You can contact Pastor Gagnon if you have any questions about this policy.
