Today we celebrate Reformation Sunday! This week (10/31) marks 507 years since Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of Castle Church in Wittenburg, Germany thus marking the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. His list of complaints against the Catholic Church, which largely called out the corruption and abuse by clergy, led him to be excommunicated and eventually began the rise of the Protestant denominations. Luther never intended to leave the Catholic Church, but instead hoped that his condemnation of their practices would bring about reform. He was not the only figure of his time who had this intent - across Europe and the rest of the world were many other church figures who also cried out against the injustices they were witnessing. Of note for Presbyterians, John Calvin and John Knox participated in the movement that eventually became the Reformed Tradition.

For centuries, we have used the phrase "Reformed and Always Reforming". It is a slogan that pays homage to those who have come before us, paving the road for diversity in theological thought and expressions of worship. It also lends itself to the notion that God is still at work among us - reforming us into a future that He has set out for us. To celebrate this day is to celebrate the many ways that our creativity, imagination, and faithfulness keep us on our toes, always curious to what new thing God is doing in our community.
