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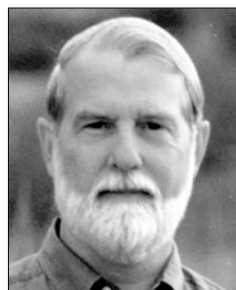
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Dr. Moulton to be keynote speaker

Dr. Gary Moulton will be the keynote speaker at a Lewis and Clark regional meeting and program on Saturday, April 21 at the Missouri Department of Conservation Discovery Center, 4750 Troost, Kansas City, Mo. The meeting is from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

"We hope to have at least 100 people from around the Midwest, especially the Lewis and Clark chapters in Missouri and Nebraska, and even people from all over the country," said Jennifer Scott, chapter meeting chairman. "We also invite the public to attend. We urge members to bring friends and family. Of course, anyone can come for a portion of the day. It will be a great day, especially with the appearance by Dr. Moulton."

The cost to attend is \$15 for registration and materials. Registration and socializing around the Discovery Center's keelboat replica is from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m.

Beginning at 10:00 a.m. in the auditorium will be presentations by Karen Seaberg, Foundation president-elect; Gordon Julich, former Foundation president; and Wendy Raney, Foundation director of field operations. Representatives from various chapters also will make presentations. Lunch will be catered in the Lewis and Clark Room. Lunch is optional, but costs \$12 and reserva-

tions are required by April 16.

At 1:00 p.m., Dr. Moulton will present the keynote lecture, which is free and open to the public. A book-signing reception for Dr. Moulton will follow in the foyer with music by the period band Shortleaf.

At 2:45 p.m., will be a presentation by Jane Randol Jackson and Doug Eiken from the Missouri Lewis and Clark Roundtable (successor to the Missouri Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Commission).

At 3:15 p.m., attendees are invited to join a driving tour to 8th and Jefferson, Lewis and Clark Point and confluence of the Missouri and Kansas Rivers, Lewis and Clark Historic Park at Kaw point, One Fairfax Drive.

An optional dinner gathering will be held at 5:30 p.m. at The Savoy, 9th and Central, Kansas City, Mo.

"A Week with Lewis and Clark" Chapter to Offer Guided Motorcoach Tour to Lewis and Clark Trail Sites

This summer, the Missouri-Kansas Riverbend Chapter once again will offer a guided motorcoach tour of Lewis and Clark Trail sites. Organized and guided by historian Ross Marshall, the tour will visit trail sites to the east of Kansas City.

As in the past, the tour departs from 7th and Pennsylvania in downtown Kansas City, Mo., at 8:30 am and returns at 5:00 pm. Parking is free.

This will be the last in our series of motorcoach tours covering the entire Lewis and Clark expedition route in western Missouri and northeast Kansas. This tour will cover approximately a week of the 1804 expedition from June 19-26.

We will journey along Highway 210 and the north side of the Missouri River, making stops at

Randolph, La Benite Park, Liberty Bend, Missouri City and Cooley Lake Park.

We will stop at Richmond and the wonderful Ray County Courthouse, then across the river to Lexington.

In Lexington, we will visit the Lexington Museum, have lunch (on our own) along the historic Main Street, followed by a walking and bus tour of historic Lexington, led by local historian Roger Slusher.

We will continue the journey along the Missouri River, stopping at Napoleon Landing and ending at Fort Osage with a tour of the new Education/Visitor Center that overlooks the river.

If it is not yet officially open, we will get a guided tour anyway, led

by our own Gordon Julich, immediate past-president of the national Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation.

As we drive along, we will have readings from the journals, discussion of early Missouri history and many views of the Missouri River.

Cost is \$35, which includes the usual maps and information handouts plus admission to both the museum and visitor center.

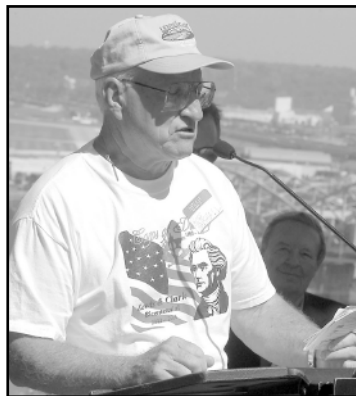

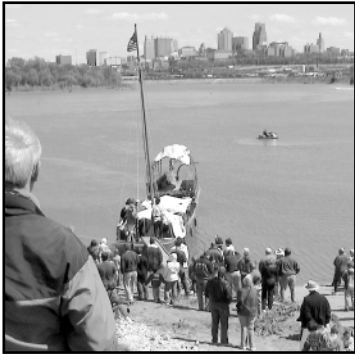

Annual Commemoration Sites

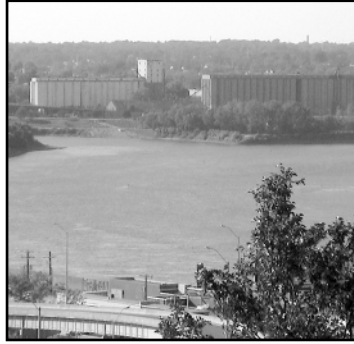
The Lewis and Clark expedition passed through the Kansas City area in June 1804 and September 1806.

Our chapter board voted to establish a program to be held annually on two dates that commemorate the expedition's upriver and downriver journeys.

To represent the upriver trip, a program will be held at 6 p.m. on June 26 each year at Lewis and Clark Historic Park at Kaw Point in downtown Kansas City,

To represent the downriver trip, a program will be held at noon on September 15 each year at Lewis and Clark Point, 8th and Jefferson in downtown Kansas City, Mo.

All chapter members are encouraged to write these dates on your calendar and make plans to attend these commemorative programs this year and each year in the foreseeable future.

Atchison dedicates Kanza lodge

A full-sized replica of a Kanza earth lodge dwelling has been completed in the vicinity where a large Kanza village once stood near Atchison, Ks.

The replica is a recreation of the dwellings the Kanza built in northeast Kansas from the mid 1600s to the late 1700s. A large uninhabited Kanza village was recorded in the journals of Lewis and Clark when they camped near Independence Creek on July 4, 1804.

The replica was built by volunteers for the Atchison County Historical Society in col-

laboration with the Kaw Nation using a grant from the National Park Service.

Construction of the replica required countless months of work by local volunteers. It will be the location of summer enrichment classes and family educational and immersion programs sponsored by the Atchison County Historical Society.

The lodge is part of a larger interpretive area that includes a trail and one of 15 geodetic markers placed by the NOAA National Geodetic Survey during the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial.



The lodge was dedicated on September 17, 2006.
