Thoughts on Romans

1:21 Because that, when they knew God, they glorified Him not as God, neither were they thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened.

The Apostle Paul is pointing out just how depraved man really is. In verse 20 he emphasizes that God has clearly revealed Himself ("For the invisible things of Him from the creation of the world are clearly seen...so that they are without excuse.").

What he is saying here is that mankind knows that God exists ("when they knew God") but does not want to treat Him as the God He is.

No people, however degraded, have yet been found without some yearning after a god, a seeking to find the true God and get back to Him. Notice what He said to the philosophers in Athens: "That they should seek the Lord, if haply they might feel after Him, and find Him, though he be not far from every one of us" (Acts 17:27).

The plain truth, however, is that unregenerate mankind does not naturally glorify God ("they glorified Him not as God"). Failure to glorify God is the ultimate definition of sin: "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23). The Apostle, writing to the Corinthians insists "Whether therefore ye eat or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God" (I Corinthians 10:31).

It is clear that *man knows in his mind more than he is willing to do*. This is the reason for the condemnation of the heathen: "For as many as have sinned without law shall also perish without law: and as many as have sinned in the law shall be judged by the law; For not the hearers of the law are just before God, but the doers of the law shall be justified. For when the Gentiles, which have not the law, do by nature the things contained in the law, these, having not the law, are a law unto themselves: Which show the work of the law written in their hearts, their conscience also bearing witness, and their thoughts the meanwhile accusing or else excusing one another; In the day when God shall judge the secrets of men by Jesus Christ according to me Gospel (Romans 2:12-16).

Beside the rebellion of man's heart, there is also the matter of ingratitude ("neither were thankful"). Paul insists that believers "rejoice evermore" (<u>I Thessalonians 5:16</u>); he also writes the following: "In everything give thanks: for *this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you* (<u>I Thessalonians 5:18</u>).

Later in this verse Paul declares man "became vain in their imaginations." Vanity=emptiness. Man, naturally wants to do whatever he wants to do, and the result is disobedience, ingratitude, emptiness, and darkening of a foolish heart!

This verse surely explains man's desperate need of salvation!

The simple truth is that knowledge of our sin is the first point of the Gospel! Paul keeps emphasizing this point in Romans, all the way through chapter 3.

Some might say that is too negative. Consider, however, what Paul says in Romans 2:4: "Or despisest thou the riches of His goodness and forbearance and longsuffering, not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance?

Awareness of our sin is actually a very good thing! Why, for instance, would anyone want to hear about faith, grace, the blood of Christ, His bodily resurrection, and the offer of eternal life if he feels he is not in any danger?

However, when a person who is presented with the awfulness of sin from the Word of God and the Holy Spirit is working on his heart, that THEN he has the opportunity to repent, believe, ask Jesus to save him, and be born again!

Unfortunately, many believers do not want to present the truth about man's sin because it is a "stumbling block" to the hearer and presents the possibility of rejection of the truth.

It is, however, man's greatest problem, and until he faces it squarely and puts his faith in Jesus Christ, he is "without excuse"!
