


Lent is a season of 40-days beginning on February 14 (Ash Wednesday) not counting Sundays, and concludes on Holy Saturday. "Lent" comes from the Anglo Saxon word Lenten which means "lengthen" and refers to the lengthening days of Spring. The forty days represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry.

Lent is a time of repentance, fasting, and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time for self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent began as a period preparing new converts and evolved into a period of penance by all Christians. Today, Christians frequently use Lent as a time to focus on their relationship with God, grow as disciples and extend themselves, often choosing to give up something and give themselves for others.

The new year is less than 30 days old, and in that time we have endured one of the most severe winters we have had in a few years. In some cases, outdoor Christmas decorations are buried under snow and ice and may not appear until Spring! So as think about your reindeer and snowmen, the calendar is telling us Easter is not that far away. Lent will begin Wednesday, February 14th with Ash Wednesday. Therefore, apart from Sunday, February 11th , the rest of the Sunday's in February will be supporting the Lenten theme "The Trials of Jesus."

Like a courtroom drama, a series of witnesses comes forward to give testimony about their experiences with the accused – Jesus Christ. Through their accounts we come to know the truth, that Jesus came to take our place in the defendants chair.

Hosting Presbytery

At its meeting in January, the Session decided to host the hybrid meeting of the Presbytery of East Iowa at our church on November 23rd . This may be the first time this has happened, and we will provide our house for those who will attend the meeting in person as well as those who will join the meeting via Zoom. Hosting includes providing the sanctuary for worship and the business meeting, providing lunch for those who are attending in person, and a few rooms in which committees and educational groups can gather. The meeting begins at 10 a.m. and concludes by 2 p.m. We will be in conversation with officers of the presbytery in the coming months to flesh out the details, but suffice it to say, we will need persons to serve lunch, operate the lift, and provide hospitality, and possibly assist with a shutter service between area parking areas and the church. More on this will be announced in subsequent editions of the "Connections."





Sunday School for Adults ... It's all about sharpening the edge of our knowledge of What it takes to be an effective disciple of Jesus Christ. We do deep dives into various books of the bible as well as timely subjects on ministry and mission.

Beginning Sunday, January 28th through Sunday, February 11th we will undertake the first part of a study entitled "The Message of the Sermon on the Mount." This study will focus on the 5th chapter of Matthew. The Message of the Sermon of the Mount is different from both the nominal church and the secular world, different from both the religious and the irreligious. The Sermon of the Mount is the most complete description anywhere in the New Testament of this Christian counter-culture. This is the nearest to a manifesto Jesus ever uttered as he provides his own description of what he wanted his followers to be and do.

Beginning February 18th through Easter, the class will undertake the study "God Never Gives Up on You: What Jacob's Story Teaches Us About Grace, Mercy and God's Relentless Love" This is a five-session Bible study for the members of the "Lost Halo Society" it's for the strugglers among us and the fumblers within us. It's for those who are part saint and part scoundrel. It's for those who mean well but don't always do well. And it's for those who could use a refresher course on how God enacts his perfect plan in this world by working through imperfect people. This DVD based study written by Max Lucado reveals how God used Jacobthe misbehaving patriarch who was strong on savvy but low on conscience-simply because God chose to use Jacob. Period. The word for such devotion? Grace. Grace came after Jacob. Grace found him in the desert. Grace protected him in exile. Grace wrestled him to the ground and blessed him. Grace led him home to Canaan. Jacobs story invites us to believe in a God who sticks with the unworthy and underachievers until we are safely at home.

The class meets in Edwards Chapel at 9 a.m. each Sunday. This is a great time to build up your spiritual muscles and explore what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ.



Reflections of Lent

For many of us one of the very first Bible stories that we learned as children was probably the story of the creation of humankind by God out of the dust of the earth. God took a lump of dust and breathed into it the "ruah" or breath of God, and it became a living being. Fantastic stuff, this notion that ordinary dust could become alive through the ruah of God.

A little later, probably about the time I was in late elementary school I learned another bit of fantastic stuff, that our human bodies are made up of about 99% water and a little bit of solid matter, "dust" if you will. Perhaps, if I had only thought about it then, I shouldn't have been surprised at that epiphany, and the thought that, if all of the water were removed from my body, all that would remain is a bit of dust.

And so it all comes together for me as an adult on the First Day of Lent, which we call Ash Wednesday. We receive a mark of ash in the form of a cross on our foreheads with the admonition "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return..." The prayer for the blessing of the ashes says "Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior."

In that action of inscribing an ashen mark on our foreheads there is perhaps one of the most paradoxical of all our liturgical acts if there ever was one. That little smudge of ash is superimposed upon another mark, the indelible one made at the moment of our baptism when we are sealed and marked as Christ's own forever.

The mark of the ash reminds us of where came from and where we are going, "from ashes to ashes and from dust to dust.." A stark reminder that there is an ultimate defeat of our mortal nature, of all of our hard-won and cherished progress and all of our earthly accomplishments. And superimposing this mark upon the indelible mark on our souls tells us that we cannot come to the full and eternal life promised in baptism without taking seriously our need for the total and sacrificial offering of ourselves, our souls and bodies.

Sooner or later we will all wash the ash smudge off of our foreheads, but even if the material ash we receive is gone, the spiritual mark remains until Easter Day.

I would suggest that each of us, as we mark these forty days of Lent daily place before God a new and figurative batch of ashes each morning. Where might those ashes come from?

The first source is everything about you and your life which has been taken from you without your consent- the hurts, the unkind words and deeds, the power plays that sent you reeling, the withdrawal of recognition and support that someone else decided you should no longer have and had the power to take from you. Let God take those things and burn them up in God's consuming fire.

The second source are those things about you and your life that has special significance, either positive or negative, that you choose to offer to God for both transformation and renewal. There are things about each of us that may have had value once, but their day is past and they are ready either for burning or for renewing by God's ruah.

So daily, in your mind, take something from each source and place it before God and ask that God's fire come and consume it. Offer it up totally so that only the very residue of the ash remains. Then mark the sign of the cross on your own forehead as a daily reminder that which has not died cannot be raised, and anything not surrendered cannot be made new again, except by the creating, redeeming and sustaining love of God.

We rise again from ashes, from the good we've failed to do. We rise again from ashes to create ourselves anew. If all the world is ashes, then must our lives be true, an offering of ashes, an offering to you.

We offer you our failures, we offer you attempts, the gifts not fully given, the dreams not fully dreamt. Give our stumblings direction, give our visions wider view, an offering of ashes, an offering to you.

Then rise again from ashes, let healing come to pain, though spring has turned to winter, and sunshine turned to rain. The rain we'll use for growing, and create the world anew from an offering of ashes, an offering to you.

Thanks be to the Father, who made us like himself. Thanks be to the Son, who saved us by his death. Thanks be to the Spirit, who creates the world anew from an offering of ashes, an offering to you. (Text by Tom Curry)

I invite you to keep this paradoxical and great truth before you as you seek to walk a holy Lent.
