The purpose of the meeting will be to receive the annual report, elect a nominating committee, an elder and trustee, amend the by-laws and all other business that is brought before the congregation.





We're Going to General Assembly!

Let's clarify this. First Presbyterian Church, Burlington, Iowa will be at the General Assembly in Salt Lake City this summer through Allison Nalley, who will be representing the Presbytery of East Iowa as the Youth Advisor Delegate. Allison was endorsed by our Session to be nominated and elected to the YAD position. She will join the YADs from all the other presbyteries across the United States in deliberating on and providing the youth vote on all the matters brought before the General Assembly. Allison is a graduating senior at Mediapolis High School. She has been accepted at a number of colleges and universities, she has yet to make her final selection. Currently she is looking at a Business degree. While finishing up her studies at Mediapolis, Allison is also enrolled in courses at SCC. Youth Advisory Delegates must be between 18 and 24 years of age.

As a YAD, Allison will be assigned to a standing General Assembly Committee where she will meet and discuss with all other commissioners to the General Assembly the issues specifically referred to them and form the recommendations for action to be addressed by the entire assembly during their plenary sessions. Allison will have the opportunity to stay up late, eat pizza and meet a wide diversity of young adults from big city churches to small town churches, and grow in her understanding of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Congratulations, Allison! We're proud of you. Get ready for a phenomenal experience.



<u>The Sermon</u>

From the Pastor's Desk

January 6th – it is a Saturday – it is also Epiphany. For many that doesn't mean much. In ordinary conversation folks have been known to tell others of some "epiphany" experience. Generally, they are referring to an awakening to new information. In the life of the church, Epiphany is the day on which we celebrate the visitation of the Magi to Jesus, who by this time is not an infant, but a toddler. Scripture tells us the wise men did not come to the stable shortly after the shepherds, but in fact, two years after Christ's birth, and when they arrive, they come to the house in Bethlehem where the holy family resides. You have to remember, these three kings from the orient who saw the star in the sky and began following it out of curiosity, traveled hundreds of miles by camel. In spite of our romantic ideas of to place the wise men on the periphery of our nativity sets, the fact is they arrived two years after the fact.

However, I am digressing. The wise men were astronomers, men of science who followed a very unusual star in the eastern sky. Their "epiphany" occurred when they arrived in Bethlehem and realized the star they had curiously followed was a sign from God that led them to the child who would be the Messiah of God, the King of the Jews, the Savior of the world. In that moment, their eyes were opened and they saw the salvation of humankind in the child called Jesus. This would be heralded as the good news of God's plan for the salvation of the world being shared with gentiles. Here's my second "however." However, this was not a warm fuzzy hallmark moment when everyone lives happily ever after. What follows is the very opposite. According to a sermon preached by Fred Craddock, distinguished Professor of Preaching and New Testament in the Candler School of Theology at Emory University, there is a "Hard Side of Epiphany." That "hard side of Epiphany" is what the sermons of January will focus on. The Good News is not good news to everyone; the good news has enemies. Announcing the truth of the Good News makes enemies; standing up for the truth of the Good News comes with a price that not everyone wants to pay.

So, you are cordially invited to all of our worship services in January and see for yourself what the hard side of Epiphany means for each of us.

Confirmation Classes to Begin

Beginning Sunday, January 7th and continuing through April 7th , our young people from 6th grade through high school will be preparing to become members of the church. The classes will be held every Sunday afternoon from 3:00 to 4:30 pm. at the church. Each week, these students will explore the fundamentals of faith and begin laying the foundation for their own statement of faith which they will share with the Session April 14th . The curriculum will lift up the tenets of our faith as displayed in the confessions of the church. Each student will have a "faith coach," who will be a member of the church who will help guide, encourage and be an example. These coaches will be available to ask questions of, quiz their student on what they are learning, and assist them in developing their statements of faith.

Here's an invitation to you adult church members to help us honor the vows we took when these young people were baptized. We promised to stand alongside their parents in assisting these youngsters in growing in their faith in Jesus Christ so that one day they might confess him to be their Lord and Savior. If you feel called or led to do this, speak with Rev. Johnson who is the Confirmation teacher.



Pastor's Year-End Thoughts

By the time many of you read this, Christmas for all intents and purposes, will be in our rear view mirror. Time, as it has always done, moves on and on the horizon is New Years. Good-bye 2023, hello 2024. I never was very good with establishing resolutions, or for that matter, carrying through on them. Resolutions are great, often lofty goals designed to advance and improve our health, our financial well-being, our attitudes and behaviors. But they seldom are kept considering the unbelievable strength of will required to keep them past a few hours, days or weeks, if we're so fortunate.

I did an internet search for resolutions I could suggest for you and save you the frustrating effort of creating them on your own. Isn't that what good, thoughtful, caring pastors do? No matter how I Googled it, I was horribly dissatisfied, because in the end, underlying the whole process of resolutions is the issue of personal strength and willpower. How desperately committed are we to making changes in our lives? So, as we say farewell to 2023, which has been for me an unbelievably rich and rewarding, blessing-filled 12-months, I ask but one thing of myself and each of you. It is what Jesus asked of those he spoke to on the hillside with the Sermon on the Mount. It appears in the 6th chapter of Matthew in a section wherein Jesus lovingly and compassionately encourages his listeners to not worry. In his plain talking way, Jesus says: "I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes?" After that he says a bunch of other things to re-enforce his concern about worrving, but concludes with what I believe should be our new years' resolution: "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

The Amplified Version of the Bible reports this verse this way: *But first and most importantly seek (aim at, strive after) His kingdom and His righteousness [His way of doing and being right—the attitude and character of God], and all these things will be given to you also.* Notice the parentheticals. Jesus is saying, "make as your priority (because your life depends on it) adopting God's ways as your own, doing what is right (which you already know), and not just have the attitude of God, but God's character as well. If you do this (which will take all your time and energy), be assured that everything you might have worried about will be taken care of.

This is Jesus calling us to keep everything in perspective. How often do we waste an enormous amount of time, energy and resources worrying about things we can't change? In doing so, are we not forgetting whose will it is we should be seeking fulfilled? By seeking God's kingdom and righteousness first we can't help but find perspective for everything else. Christ's wisdom contin-

ues when he concludes by reminding us, "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

There you are, my friends, the "mother" of all resolutions. As huge as this may seem, know this isn't all on you. You have a partner, a coach rooting for you. Jesus is walking with you and will provide you strength and courage. With this resolution, you can't fail.




The Shepherd's Table

Meeting Highlights

Session Highlights from December 14, 2023 Meeting

Certainly a highlight from the December session meeting was Pastor Dick informing the group that our presbytery needed a **Young Adult Advisory Delegate (YAAD)** to General Assembly in Salt Lake City, Utah, next summer, and that we had a very qualified young person in our congregation, **Allison Nalley**. He had spoken with Allison, and she was willing to serve. Session unanimously approved nominating her to present to presbytery as a delegate. Presbytery will vote on December 20, and is expected to elect her to this important role.

The Trustees recently elected the following **officers of the corporation** as follows: President – Doyle Ruble, Vice President – Marcia Stiefel, Secretary – Leona Byars, and Treasurer - Eva Ann Elmer. Session approved their report.

Session voted to recommend the following church bylaw changes for approval by the congregation at the January 21, 2024 congregational meeting. The first two are needed to function in new ways in this electronic age and to comply with the Book of Order. Proposed bylaws: (1) The Church authorizes Session to use electronic forms of voting, as described in the Book of Order. (2) The Church allows congregational and session meetings to be held electronically, as described in the Book of Order. (3) Delete Bylaw #20 which says "A quorum for Session shall be the pastor or other presiding officer and a majority of the elders." Reason: Session determines its own quorum.

Committees: **Mission** - The Angel tree provided Christmas gifts for 13 adults and 20 youth. Ten food baskets were filled. For Stead Family Children's Hospital in Iowa City, 24 books were sent as Christmas gifts for the children, with Target gift cards provided for the adults. The monthly special mission project, benefitting the NICU in Iowa City, yielded a total of \$1,062, which Wendy used to purchase needed items and gift cards. **Tech & Communications** – Wendy is working on the new website, with the goal of having it functional January 1.

For 2024: Communion dates were approved, with it being served traditionally and by intinction on alternating months. The proposed budget for 2024 was reviewed and approved, to be presented at the January congregational meeting. Per Capita next year is \$42.17 per member. With 91 members on our roll, our total is \$3,837.47.

Session will elect a new Clerk of Session in January. It needs to be an ordained Elder, either one currently on session or a non-serving one.

Upcoming: Next Session meeting will be January 11, 2024, at 1:00 P.M. Date of annual congregational meeting is January 21, 2024.






