Growing Pains

When I was a kid I would frequently wake up with pains in my legs. These pains were best described as ache or throbbing feeling. They were in the front of my thighs, my calves or behind the knee. Sometimes it was one or the other leg, but most often both legs. I could go weeks and not have any pain, but then all of a sudden have them every night for an entire week. When these pains occurred, I would limp and cry my way to mom who would rub my legs and administer an ample dose of TLC.

When you're a little kid, moms know everything. They are supposed to know all the reasons, all the "whys" and "how comes." So when my legs hurt and I would ask "how come my legs hurt," her answer seemed reasonable. "Honey, they're growing pains." After a few nights of hurting I asked "why does growing up have to hurt so much?"

According to the Mayo Clinic, folks who know more about those pains in my legs than my mom, growing pains don't usually happen where growth is occurring or during times of rapid growth. It's been suggested that growing pains may be linked to restless leg syndrome. But in the vast majority of children, growing pains are from overuse during the day. Overuse includes, running, climbing, jumping, which can be hard on a child's musculoskeletal system. For explanations I prefer mom's answer. Being short, I always was hoping that all these pains meant I was going to be tall, at least taller than my 4'11' inch mother. The long and short of this, is there is no cure for growing pains. Mom's TLC was and remains the best medicine for dealing with growing pains.

But, what do we do with the growing pains we feel as adults, when our souls hurt and our consciences ache? Are those pains the result of overuse? I would suggest that one such cause is the challenge God presents to grow in our faith, trust and willingness to go where God wishes us to go, do what God needs us to do, and be the people God needs us to be. Daily we are confronted with a culture that is not always reflective of or anywhere close to the kingdom of

heaven, and God has expectations of each of responding to the challenge of confronting the culture. Scripture is not a timid, wilting book of suggestions. It is a series of commands and expectations of who we all are supposed to be. Nowhere is permission given to hate or mouth the words of hate speech. The Bible does not condone division and being judgmental. there is advocating of the "survival of the fittest," or that relationships are transactional. It doesn't take having MENSA membership to know that true believers advocate peace, love, unity, forgiveness and grace.

So the pain we feel in our hearts, souls and consciences is often the pain God feels when we fail to embrace being his children. That pain is often God working in us to be everything opposite what the culture is. It is God placing the burden on our hearts to speak and act with love; to build community and live inclusively. It is speaking truth with love and loving our neighbors as ourselves. It is building community instead of tearing it down. It's not easy to act like Jesus, but that is what's expected. These growing pains only go away when we choose to say as Isaiah said, "Here am I, send me."

Special Congregational Meeting

On Sunday, June 9th, the Session has called a special congregational meeting to be held immediately following the worship service. The meeting conforms with the congregation's by-laws which requires this meeting be held at this time to elect new officers. At this meeting, the Nominating Committee will present a slate of names for election as Elders, Deacons and Trustees. In addition to this business, you will be asked to give the Trustees permission to list for sale our property of Mason Road.

A note of explanation regarding this second item of business. For old timers and those new to the congregation, over twenty-years ago a 10-acre parcel of farm ground was purchased by the church as an investment and the potential site for either a new church building, or a building that would be used for ministry and mission activities. The property was bought and paid for with money already held by the congregation. We "loaned" ourselves the funds and have since being paying ourselves back. We were/are our own mortgage holders.

In the following years, there have been discussions about building a new church on that site and relocating from the hills and concrete of downtown to a flat open site. Those conversations did not find a consensus of thought and the property continued to be rented as agricultural fields in which corn and soybeans have been raised. In the meantime we have paid the real estate taxes on this property and continued to make our mortgage payments, albeit to ourselves. It should be noted that the mortgage payment comes from General Fund contributions.

The recommendation to sell comes from the Trustees and the Session has concurred. We no longer have a viable vision for the use of this property. The congregation is smaller than it was when the property was first purchased and the cost of construction has exponentially increased, making the construction of any building a nearly impossible heavy lift. This comes at a time when we are investing over \$500,000 in the restoration and reconstruction of the bell tower and refinishing and repairing the north exterior wall of the church.


We will not know when or if this property will sell, or for that matter, what it's worth is. That is based on who would like it, what they envision as its use, and how urgently they would like to develop it. The consensus of your Trustees and Session is that there is no justification for continuing to hold onto this property. That is what is behind seeking the congregation's permission of listing it for sale.

Bell Tower Repair Project Update

The repair and restoration of the church's bell tower is underway with the campaign to raise the remaining portion of what will be required to pay for the work required. The total cost is roughly \$560,000. We began this fund drive with \$450,000 in hand. To a large degree these funds have been made available through bequests. The remaining balance of \$100,000 will be raised through contributions. We have one church member who has anonymously pledged to contribute \$2 for every dollar donated by the congregation. Our goal is to raise through donations \$50,000. The graph shows our progress to date toward that goal.

Our responsibility as stewards is to care for everything God has provided us. That includes one of our greatest assets, the church building. From it, in it we do the work we've been commissioned to do – to preach, teach, and bring people into a vital and vibrant relationship with Jesus Christ. Every Sunday we worship a community of faith to not just learn what God's saying through his word, but feel the encourage and inspiration from our fellowship to apply that word to life. The church building becomes the launch pad of mission projects, and it becomes a place where we can invite the community to come in and join us in music and song in the praise of God.

Every contribution is important and special, no matter the amount. Jesus found cause to celebrate the widow who gave a mite because she gave all she had and gave from her heart. Here at First Presbyterian we cherish every person and every gift, and we do and will give thanks for every dollar received. Please consider how God is leading you to support this very special project.

The Shepherd's Table

It takes a village...to plan and serve a Shepherd's Table meal...

Let's step back in time to the spring of 2023 and take a look at the village involved with the Shepherd's Table. The project started when members of the First Congregational Church recognized a neighborhood and community need, and wanted to help. They began serving a free monthly meal, inviting anyone to partake in food and fellowship.

After a few months, more help was needed, and First Presbyterian was invited to participate. We excitedly accepted the invitation, and became involved in April 2023. Our Mission Committee took the project under its wing, and began collaboration with the Congregationalists. Now, a year later, let's go behind the scenes to see what is involved in this monthly event.

"What's for dinner?" is the first question to answer. A planning meeting is held with women of both churches, and the menus are set for the next six months. The schedule alternates between each church furnishing the main dish or the sides and dessert. A sign-up sheet asks for volunteers to contribute food or help serve the meal. Grocery lists are made and shopping is done.
