WE BELONG TO GOD

How do you deal with your critics?

We've all got them—family, friends, co-workers, bosses, customers, next-door neighbors, internet strangers. Life with other humans inevitably involves conflict, debate and even division.

In our lectionary readings this June and July, we learn of Paul's work in Corinth and those who opposed it. In his second letter to the Corinthian church, Paul offers a fierce defense of his ministry among them. Men whom Paul sarcastically calls "super-apostles" (2 Corinthians 11:5, 12:11) have called into question his ministry, his missed visit, his request for financial support for other Christian communities and even his teachings.

What's an evangelist to do? A preacher challenged on his authority might try many options for converting his "fellow workers" back to his side: sophisticated philosophy, an appeal to relationship and history, even a stern warning. While Paul fiercely defends his ministry, his theme throughout the letter isn't his competence in debate but the radical idea of power revealed in weakness. He focuses not on his skill as a minister but on his and his fellow preachers' suffering as they've worked for the gospel. Paul says their praise comes from "afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger" (6:4-5).

BUILDING UP THE CHURCH ISN'T ABOUT US—HOW MUCH WE GIVE, HOW HARD WE WORK, HOW LONG WE'VE BEEN HERE. IT'S ABOUT THE PROMISE OF NEW CREATION.

When our Christian character is challenged, we might want to point to our qualifications (and Paul certainly does that too). Nevertheless, at his best, Paul remembers who the gospel is about and pulls his authority from Jesus.

Building up the church isn't about us—how much we give, how hard we work, how long we've been here. It's about the promise of new creation. In Jesus, our successes are less important than the joy of knowing our past mistakes are forgiven. In Jesus, our personal skills and spiritual résumé are nothing compared to our reconciliation with God.Continues on Page 2

We Belong to God continues....

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So, how do you deal with your critics? Well, this summer's readings from 2 Corinthians present one option: stay grounded in who you are as a beloved child of God and who God is as your holy parent.

Paul doesn't accept an invitation to a debate. He tells his story, including the suffering and pain, because, even though not every chapter is finished, he already knows the ending: "an eternal weight of glory, beyond all measure." Paul refuses to let his suffering or his critics suggest that his work has been in vain. He knows to whom he belongs: not to his past, his mistakes or his detractors but to God.

In late June, leaders of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) participated in a visit to Rome. The LWF delegation consisted of representatives from the seven regions of the global communion of churches, including Elizabeth Eaton, presiding bishop of the ELCA.

In their meeting, both Archbishop Panti Filibus Musa, LWF president, and Pope Francis expressed hope that the 500th anniversary of the Augsburg Confession—the primary confession of faith for Lutheran churches around the globe —in 2030 can become common ground on which to strengthen Lutherans' and Catholics' commitment to unity and reconciliation.


LONG BEACH MIGRANT CHILDREN UPDATE

Three months after the Long Beach Convention Center was turned into a massive shelter for migrant children who arrived at the U.S.-Mexico border unaccompanied, all of them have left the facility. The 1,538 children who were being housed there have either been reunited with family, a sponsor in the U.S. or taken to a more permanent shelter.

"We could not be more proud to know that, as a city, we played a part of a much broader mission," Mayor Robert Garcia said. Garcia thanked our community for its support, state and federal leaders, city partners, and the team who worked directly with these vulnerable children.

A TRAIL OF ALTARS

They Are Us: Lutherans and Immigration—In the book, we attempted to build a biblical case for embracing immigrants and refugees, tell the history of immigration in the United States and the Lutheran church, highlight policy issues and share the work Lutheran leaders and congregations were doing across the nation. The church that becomes the face of Jesus to the poor, the stranger and those without the gospel is a church that is always being renewed and reformed. Such renewal is powered by Jesus' resurrection from the dead.

AN ONGOING CIRCLE OF LOVE

Lutheran summer camps are scattered across our denomination. The experiences one finds at church camp can drastically change whole trajectories. The magic of church camp, really all of Lutheran outdoor ministries, is that we can, even if just for a moment, be our full and complete selves. Today Pinecrest is still a place where people can be whoever they need to be. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries facilities are places where God kneels down and reminds us that we are never truly alone in our struggles. Pinecrest has been and remains an ever-expanding circle of love for all of God's children—no matter what.

A HOLDING SPACE FOR HEALING

In the heart of California's San Joaquin Valley, Christ Lutheran Church has a story of groundbreaking reconciliation and restoration ministry to share. Called by the transformative love of God, the congregation's Agape Group invites people to share their stories of religious trauma and abuse. These traumas range from religious rejection to physical and sexual abuse at the hands of religious leaders and organizations. Participants agree to a group covenant of confidentiality and welcome. A brief presentation affirms that the congregation, the Sierra Pacific Synod and the ELCA all honor LGBTQIA+ people as unique and beloved children of God and value their participation at all levels of leadership.

SOMEONE CARES — PASS IT ON

MAGIC MAKERS — In 2015, my friend's 3-year old daughter, Lily, was diagnosed with cancer. As an oncology nurse, I knew the challenges that she and her family faced. I couldn't stop thinking about Lily's beautiful blonde hair, which she would lose during treatment. I decided to crochet a wig for her. Yarn is much softer on the scalp than a traditional wig. Using yellow yarn, I made a wig with long hair, just like Rapunzel's from the Disney movie *Tangled*. Lily loved it, and getting the wig really lifted her spirits. I knew I had to create more wigs for other kids battling cancer.

I talked to my friend Bree Hitchcock, and together we founded the **Magic Yarn Project**. We converted my garage into a craft room and enlisted other friends to help. We held work-shops to teach people how to make the princess-themed wigs, as well as crocheted beanies inspired by kids' favorite animated characters, from Spiderman to Minnie Mouse.

Today, we have 15 chapters around the U.S. Our volunteers, including some who are incarcerated, have created more than 30,000 wigs for children in 51 countries. There is no cost to the children's families. **Want to help?** Visit **themagicyarnproject.com**, or find us on Facebook.
