If I'm counting right, this will be our 18th Sunday in Lockdown. Eighteen weeks living in isolation for our own protection. Eighteen weeks since we last worshipped together in our sanctuary. That's more than 1/3 of the year that we've been physically apart. Sometimes it seems like it's been forever. Sometimes it seems to have just slipped by so quickly.

Thankfully, we've had good electronic tools that have enabled us to continue worshipping together and studying together. Thankfully, we have kept in communication with ZOOM and phone calls and emails. I know, though, that this is not everybody's cup of tea. Still, after 18 weeks, a third of a year, I think we've got the hang of it more or less.

In Greek there are two different words for time: chronos and kairos. Chronos is chronological time, the ticking of the clock, the 60-minute hour, the 24-hour day. Kairos is the full moment, the instant the fruit is ripe for picking, the time when all the ducks are in a row. We don't know how much time (chronos) it will be before we can safely worship together again in person, but when that time (kairos) comes it will be a joyful day.





MICHAEL MECKNA—A SMILE FULL OF LIGHT...



Michael Meckna was born in Long Beach, California in 1945. His grandmother bought him a trumpet when he was about nine years old, and he played continuously, winning awards and guesting with the Long Beach Symphony several times in his youth. He hurt his lip (not uncommon among trumpeters) and eventually graduated from CSULB with a degree in Spanish in 1967, having spent his junior year living and studying in Mexico City. He loved words in any language (He also spoke fluent French and had studied Latin, ancient Greek, and German.), and conversed in Spanish with one of his dear Hospice nurses on his deathbed.

Michael studied theology and psychology at Boston College but could never quite commit to either one. He lived in Boston five glorious years and immersed himself in the culture there, haunting museums, and going to concerts and lectures. He read voraciously and lived the life of the mind.

It was when he returned to the West Coast in 1974 that he began his study of classical languages, and that was how he met his wife, Eva, who was his Greek and then also Latin tutor. He was not smitten with the languages as much as he was with his tutor. They married in 1976, he returned to the other great love of his life (music), and they moved to Santa Barbara in 1978, spending six years in married students' housing while he pursued his Ph.D. in musicology which he received in 1984. Fellow grad students called him, "The Swami," because he "knew all, saw all." You needed help, you saw Mike!

Right out of the gate (a phenomenon for musicologists!) Michael got a full-time tenure track job at Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana. After six years there, Texas Christian University in Fort Worth offered him his dream job in 1990 where he became full professor in record time and continued teaching the music he loved. And he loved his students whom he nurtured in many, many ways, from achieving musical/scholarly goals to helping those not really "called" to music to leave it. Michael was also famous for his avuncular personal advice about relationships, marriage, finding yourself, and basically just the meaning of life. He was first and foremost someone who listened to people.

Diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2009 and Alzheimer's in 2016, he led the most active retirement he could after the move back to Long Beach in 2011. Michael started the guitar program at Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at CSULB and taught for as long as he was able. He also sang tenor in the OLLI choir. He volunteered at the local public library and participated in a bookclub there. (All women! He loved it!) He played guitar, of course, and then came back to the instrument he had played as a kid: harmonica. All around his neighborhood on his walks with his wife, Michael would play his harmonica from his wheelchair, receiving applause and love, and inspiring high spirits and laughter. That was just Michael all over: making friends wherever he went.
