- Council members discussed the 2024 proposed budget, for recommendation to vote at the congregational meeting Jan. 28
- At November council meeting, accepted the October Treasurer's report, with year-todate donations of \$181,756 received against expenses of \$187,753 (not including roof)
- Approved renewing the \$20,000 CD of contingency fund, as donations to the capital campaign for the roof replacements are likely to be sufficient, along with existing funds to put towards the roof
- Finalized the language of proposed
 Constitutional amendment to allow for phone
 or video participation in annual
 congregational meetings. Congregational
 vote will be Jan. 28 at annual meeting
- Approved benevolence distributions to Rwanda School Project, Navajo Christian Prep Academy, New Creation Home Ministries, SF Night Ministry, Street Life Ministries, Lutheran Disaster Relief, Second Harvest Food Bank
- Appreciation for the generosity of our congregation!



Ecclesiastes Chapter 1 - A Reflection by Peter Meier

"One generation passes away, another generation comes, but the earth still remains and the sun also rises."

Those words from Ecclesiastes were burned into a large woodcut that my father Michael made one summer, when we were visiting the farm in Wisconsin where he grew up The woodcut had an image of a sunrise over mountains. He brought the woodcut back from Wisconsin and it hung for years in his office in Corvallis, Oregon, where I grew up. And then it traveled with him as he and my stepmother moved to Alaska, Seattle, Chicago, and finally back to Wisconsin, where he retired.

As a teenager I recall reading those words and asking my Dad about their significance to him. I don't recall our conversation exactly, but I think it can be captured by the words of Solomon from verses 2-9 in Ecclesiastes, chapter 1, which include the passage quoted on the woodcut:

Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity. What do people gain from all the toil at which they toil under the sun. A generation goes, and a generation comes, but the earth remains forever. The sun rises and the sun goes down, and it hurries to the place where it rises. The wind blows to the south and goes around to the north; round and round goes the wind and on its circuits the wind returns. All streams run to the sea, but the sea is not full; to the place where the streams flow, there they continue to flow. All things are wearisome; more than one can express; the eye is not satisfied with seeing, or the ear filled with hearing. What has been is what will be, and what has been done is what will be done: there is nothing new under the sun.

"There is nothing new under the sun." I remember this part of our conversation about the woodcut and Ecclesiastes. In his middle-age years, Dad would comment that each new generation looks at the older generation and wonders, "why are they in charge of things when we can do better?" And the older generation looks at the younger generation and wonders, "what is wrong with them – do they not understand how the world works?" This is not new he said. It has always been this way, with each new generation. "There is nothing new under the sun."

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I admit that as a young man I did not find this reassuring. I am sure that I found this viewpoint to be frustrating. The notion that we – "our generation" – do not have any ideas that truly are new, but instead, our ideas – like the ideas of those who came before us – are like the wind, blowing to the south, and then to the north and round and round until it returns. Or that our lives are like the streams that run to the sea, but the sea never fills. I chafed at these notions and I wondered, "why is the older generation in charge when we can do better?" The words from Ecclesiastes – that "all is vanity" – did not offer hope or an answer to me.

But as I got older, I came to understand the short bible passage on the woodcut and what it meant to Dad. He came of age and became a pastor in a turbulent time in our society and in the church, and he heard the questions and doubts of the generation before his, the generation that grew up during the Roaring Twenties and the Great Depression. That older generation asked: "What is wrong with this new generation – do they not understand how the world works"?

I came to understand that the message of that passage from Ecclesiastes is not one of hopelessness. Solomon, the Teacher, tells us that no matter how we might chase after the wind, there are things that we cannot and will not change. But to know this is to have wisdom, not despair, for he also teaches us that God is steadfast, in Ecclesiastes, Chapter 3:

I know that whatever God does endures forever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it; God has done this, so that all should stand in awe before him. That which is, already has been; that which is to be, already is; and God seeks out what has gone by.

Therefore, enjoy your life, banish anxiety from your mind, and put away pain from your body. Take life as it comes. And remember your creator. The earth will remain, and the sun will also rise.

My Dad passed away in September. In remembering him in the weeks that followed his passing, I recalled these lessons from Ecclesiastes, which he did his best to keep in mind, and to teach to others, in words and by his example. I give thanks today for his life and gifts.
