Campaign for Working Families Free Tax Program at Mount Pisgah A. M. E. Church



God blessed us to participate for our 18th Tax Season with the Campaign for Working Families Free Tax Program. We opened our Tax Office on Friday, January 17, 2020. We were preparing taxes and serving our community until we had to close at 4 p.m. on Saturday, March 14, 2020 because of the Covid-19 virus. We reopened our Tax Site on June 8, 2020 and continued preparing tax returns for all who came.

We had to practice social distancing and take customers by

appointment only. Customers either made their appointment on the CWF Families website or they called Mt. Pisgah and Rev. Harris returned their call and made their appointment. They were required to come to their appointment wearing a mask and with their pen to complete the IRS and CWF Intake form they were given by our Intake Specialists. We were given protective gear (masks and gloves) to wear at all times. We were given hand sanitizer and spray cleanser.

Our work station consisted of 3 tables, side-by-side, to seat the Site Manager, Assistant Site Manager and 1 Site Manager or Advanced volunteer from another site sitting socially distanced. Before and after each shift we had to sanitize our work areas. We sanitized 2 tables in front of the church for people who didn't drive to our site and didn't come wearing their face mask. On rainy days we set-up a table (inside the side door of the church) for customers to complete their Intake forms, made sure all the information was complete on the Intake forms and controlled the crowd.

Customers were not allowed to enter the building because of the virus. Our customers were called when their returns were completed and were given our schedule to come back to be given a review of their return and sign a paper copy to keep if they were satisfied with the return before we electronically filed their tax return to IRS and the State of PA.

What a change, but we did it! The total returns filed in **Pennsylvania and New Jersey** including virtual tax preparation was 22,094. The total refund amount was: \$34.4 million. The amount tax filers received for the Earned Income Tax Credit was: \$7.5 million.

We would like to thank Sis. Carrie W. Yon (our Assistant Site Manager), Sis. Gwendolyn Burnett who volunteered as an Advanced Tax Preparer, Sis. Darlene Foreman, Bro. Leroy Foreman and Sis. Janet Hilliard (our Intake Specialists) for their dedication and commitment to the program. Rev. Phyllis A. Harris served as our Site Manager.

FIRST EPISCOPAL DISTRICT ANNUAL CONFERENCE SERIES – 2020 Submitted by Cheryl Hammond Hopewell

As many things have changed in 2020, the First District series of Annual Conferences was no different. The Bermuda Annual Conference in early March went off as usual, but COVID hit, and the series of Annual Conferences became virtual. As the term we have all heard on numerous occasions, we had to charter new territory.

The Bermuda Annual Conference in early March was lovely. Sister Wanda Ringgold, International YPD Director, Sister Connie Smith, Philadelphia Conference Branch WMS President and yours truly First District Lay President, set off to JFK, NY to catch a flight for the Bermuda Annual Conference. Our pastor, the Rev. Jay B. Broadnax also attends the various annual conferences since he serves as First District Executive Director of Christian Education. The Bermuda Annual Conference started things off well. It had the usual activities and worship services; The Ministry of Evangelism, the WIM Service, WMS Annual Day, the Opening Service with the Rev. Nicholas-Genevieve Tweed preaching the Annual Sermon, Lay Witness Night, Christian Education Service, YPD Annual Day and the Closing Worship Service. Bishop Ingram preaches all of the closing services. Much of the Annual Conference was one of the services that was offsite. The opening service was at St. Paul AME Church in Hamilton, Bermuda. With that, it was decided that the Annual Conferences would be virtual. All participants for any of the worship services were to pre-record their parts and submit them to be put together. We received a virtual schedule with a reduced conference for each Annual Conference starting with Delaware at the end of May. Delaware had WMS Day, the Opening Service with Rev. Dr. Erika Crawford.

Well once the Bermuda Conference ended, so did the series of Annual Conferences as we know them. Next up should have been the Delaware Annual Conference later in March. The world as we knew it got shut down, and so did the annual conferences. Though it did commence with preaching the Annual Sermon, the Closing Service and about 10 minutes of Lay Witness Night, there were too many glitches and the Delaware Annual Conference was shut down. After that, a new tech team was set up and we received a new schedule.

The New Jersey Virtual Annual Conference was already scheduled for June and with the new schedule that was kept in place. The services that took place were WMS day, the Evangelism Service, the Opening Service with the Rev. Dr. Ronald Slaughter, Pastor of St. James AME Church in Newark, NJ preaching the Annual Sermon, Lay Witness Night with yours truly as the speaker, the Closing Worship Service, YPD Day, the Christian Education Service and Church School. The first virtual annual conference was fully completed.

Next up in June, the Delaware Virtual Annual Conference had to be continued. The services that took place were the Evangelism Service, Lay Witness Night, YPD Annual Day, the Christian Education Service and Church School.





At the end of June came the New England Virtual Annual Conference. The following services took place: WMS Annual Day, the Evangelism Service, the Opening Service with Presiding Elder Jocelyn

Hart-Lovelace preaching the Annual Sermon, Lay Witness Night, the Closing Service, YPD Day, Christian Education Service and Church School.

At the beginning of July, the Women in Ministry (WIM) decided to have one virtual service instead of having one at each Virtual Annual Conference. Next up in July was the New York Virtual Annual and the services that took place were the WMS Annual Day, the Evangelism Service, the Opening Worship Service with the Rev. David Cousin preaching the Annual Sermon, Lay Witness Night, Closing Worship Service, YPD Day, Christian Education Service and Church School.

The following weekend came the Western New York Virtual Annual Conference. The services that took place were the WMS Annual Day, the Evangelism Service, Opening Service with the Rev. Richard A. Stenhouse preaching the Annual Sermon, Lay Witness Night, the Closing Worship Service, YPD Annual Day, Christian Education Service and Church School.

The final virtual service was the Philadelphia Virtual Annual Conference. Services were the WMS Annual Day, the Evangelism Service, the Opening Worship with our pastor preaching the Annual Sermon, Lay Witness Night, Closing Worship Service, YPD Day, Christian Education and Church School.

While six of the seven Annual Conferences were virtual, there were still great meetings, worship services, teaching and business sessions. With the conclusion of the 6 virtual Annual Conferences, everyone was excited to finally take a break from being on zoom so much. Unfortunately, that was not the case because starting in August, more zoom meetings continued including Planning Meeting at the end of August and several zoom meetings leading up to that one. With many churches now using zoom for worship and meetings, and the Connection, the First District and Conference component groups being forced to use zoom for meetings and conferences, it looks like zoom is here for a while so we had better get used to it.

My 2020 Philadelphia Annual Conference via Zoom Experience

Several weeks later, Pastor Jay called to inform me the meeting to elect a delegate was scheduled for the following Saturday at 1PM. Since I was committed to attending a previously scheduled late morning event the same day, I promised I would be there by 1:15PM. When the morning meeting had almost concluded, I made a hasty exit. I arrived at Mount Pisgah at 1:10PM. Hurriedly, I gathered my purse, tote bag and keys, exited the car and ran across the street to the church. The meeting was already in progress. I eased the door open, hoping to discreetly saunter to a seat in the back row. Suddenly, I hear Pastor Jay say, "Here she is now. Sister Gleaves, you've been elected delegate to represent Mount Pisgah at the 2020 Philadelphia Conference." WHAT?? Did I understand him to say I was the delegate they were going to send to the annual conference? Immediately, I plunged into a state of apoplexy, which melded to a catatonic trance. Surely, I resembled a stupefied deer staring into the blinding headlights of a tractor trailer speeding along a dark and foggy highway.

Yes, I did tell Pastor Jay I would consider, but I do not recall expressing, in any way, that I wanted to be the delegate. Is there no way out of my present dilemma? Umm, maybe if I made Pastor Jay aware that writing lengthy, detailed reports is not one of my finer points, he just might reconsider sending me to the conference. So, I told him about my lack of writing skills. He replied, "No worries. We've been moving towards oral reports." Foiled again!!! I appreciate the love and confidence our congregation expressed in electing me delegate. I love each and every one for the support. In fact, I would love them all the more, if they had elected a younger, tech savvy delegate. Well, I guess, by now, you've deduced my being the delegate from Mount Pisgah AME Church of Philadelphia to the annual conference is not on my bucket list.

Lord God Almighty, please help me pull myself together, so I can give my very best in service. Enable me to attend every session and worship experience. Empower me to take copious notes. Please give me an understanding, knowledge and wisdom to write a clear and concise report on all information I am to convey to the congregation. Amen.

By February 2020, most of the world was talking about and/or affected by the spread of the virulent organism, COVID-19. By March 2020, the virus was rapidly spreading around the globe, like uncontrolled wildfires, with no let-up in sight. Governmental authorities issued orders mandating the wearing of face masks, social distancing, and quarantines. There was speculation and murmurs concerning cancellation of the annual conference. Sometime in May, we were hearing the conference would most likely be postponed, not cancelled. The decision was made to schedule a virtual conference. A virtual conference by way of Zoom? What is Zoom?

I had no idea what Zoom was, but I am confident it involves technical knowledge and computer skills of which I have minimal understanding. Obviously, someone with computer skills will be selected and I will be relieved of my role of delegate. YES!!!! Alas, my euphoria was short lived. Pastor Jay called to inform me he and Brother Keith were going to teach me the rudiments of connecting to Zoom. I tried to convince them that whatever skills one needed to learn the basics of "Operation Zoom," I lacked them all. Pastor Jay said, "No worries. It's easier than you think." Always the encourager, Pastor Jay assured me I could do it. So, it was easier than I thought. Brother Keith and Pastor Jay were patient, kind, informative, and reassuring. Within the hour, I had been taught how to access Zoom for the conference. However, I was very nervous and afraid I would not recall what I had been taught. I relaxed, when I remembered all the notes I had written.

The opening day arrived. I was up very early, as I had not slept much the night before. I was in my closet looking for an outfit for morning worship. As I was pondering which dress to wear, it dawned on me that I can wear whatever I want. After all, I'll only be visible from the waist up. Who's going to know I have my night gown under my lovely blouse? On second thought, this Zoom thing is great! I like it. Zooming out!







On Sunday, October 4, 2020, Mt. Pisgah held its first Kingdom Connections via Zoom for ages 4 to 17, where for the first time we combined Children's Church and Church School. The Class breakouts are ages 8-11, 12-14 and 15-17.

In this virtual environment, this is an effective way to reach youth who normally did not attend Church School or were too old for the Children's Church model which ended at age 11. The merging is a great opportunity for youth to experience the Urban Ministries, Inc. curriculum which was selected by our former Church School Superintendent, Douglas Clark. His vision was to have an interactive curriculum.

The Kingdom Connections model required additional teachers because of 1) the added age groups and 2) Children's Church staff served once a month instead of weekly. Rev. Harris was extraordinary in her efforts to identify teachers. Most of the original Children's Church staff have been assigned to ages 12-14 and 15-17, with a couple of new teachers added. The 15-17-year old meet at a different time because they are older. This model will be revisited when we are able to assemble to ensure a balance for the staff between teaching and attending the worship service. See chart of teachers.

When birthing a new ministry or venture, there are obstacles and challenges that must be overcome to succeed with the mission. We experienced several.

1. Douglas Clark resigned a few weeks before our launch date to pursue a new venture.. Rev. Harris stepped in and provided the needed help in a timely manner. Kingdom Connections is comprised of two components: Worship and Instruction. Part of the original plan, Doug was to organize the instructional part of Kingdom Connections along the age groupings of the UMI curriculum and Church School (2-5, 6-8, 9-11, 12-14, 15-17). He purchased the materials based on these groupings.

2. We realized from our Children's Church experiences on Zoom that we needed to combine ages 4-11 into one group. The reason is because there are not enough devices in some homes for different ages to use when the groups split into breakout rooms. Youth ages 4 to 14 are together for the worship component (the 1st 25 minutes); Youth go into breakout rooms for the instructional component using UMI curriculum for the 2nd 25 minutes. Youth come back together for the final 10 minutes. If a family has a 4 year old and an 11 year old and only one device, therein lies the problem. Chances are the 4 year old will have to follow the 11 year old into her/his breakout room. The 4 year old will not be able to experience his or her instruction and the teacher for the 4 year old group will be missing a student. For this reason we made a last minute decision to combine the 4 to 11 year olds into 1 group.

3. An obstacle for the teachers with the combined ages 4-11 is that they are using 3 different student books (2-5, 6-8, 9-11). This is challenging for the teachers, most of whom are new.







4. Another obstacle is that the wifi in some homes can be unstable which knocks the children out of Zoom.

5. If more than one child in a home are using their own devices, there's a lot of feedback which is disruptive to the class. It's not always possible for families to create enough space between the children to prevent the feedback from their devices.

6. I am the Zoom administrator by default. Because I did not know Zoom, I had to teach myself. The ins and outs of Zoom doesn't come naturally for me and as a result I have spent long hours watching Zoom and YouTube videos to learn. It has been quite stressful particularly ensuring that I gain enough knowledge where I could intelligently teach others. I still make mistakes. God is able.

7. On our first week we saw that the 12-14 year olds, who logged in did not stay on. They didn't log on in the second week. What we've learned is that 12-14 year olds do not want to be in the same session with the younger kids even though after 25 mins we will place them in their own breakout room. The staff decided to place them in their breakout room as soon as they log on. This way they stay with their own age group from beginning to end.

We are still working through the challenges. We know that with much prayer, commitment and dedication, God will bless Kingdom Connections to be a viable ministry of the church
