It's finally spring, and our thoughts quite naturally turn to the garden, so it's a propitious time to see what scripture has to say on that subject. You might not expect there to be much in a religious text on this subject, but there is a surprising wealth of commentary. The ancient Israelites were an agricultural people, and crops and gardens were very much on their minds.

It started, naturally with the beginning of humankind. After all, we started in a garden, the most perfect one ever planted. Eden was literally a paradise created for us, containing every variety of tree, growing on its own without assistance or work. We could avail ourselves of the harvest of every type of fruit tree, except one. We were forbidden to eat of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. When we disobeyed this prohibition, we reaped punishment. Our punishment was *not* exile from the Garden (a common misconception). Eve's punishment was that she would bear her children in pain and travail and would always be subject to her husband (take that, ladies!). Adam's punishment was that he would have to earn his bread by the sweat of his brow and would return to dust at death. Exile from the Garden was so they did not eat from the Tree of Life and become immortal like God. We've been trying to get back to the Garden ever since.

And God has tried to accommodate us. In Isaiah, God promises, "The Lord will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail." (Isaiah 58:11 NRSV). It is God's guarantee to the Israelites that the righteous will find life like a garden: "Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream." (Jeremiah 17:7-8 NRSV). Further, these trees bear important fruit, according to Jesus: "No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit; for each tree is known by its own fruit...The good person out of the good treasure of the heart produces good, and the evil person out of evil treasure produces evil; for it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks." (Luke 6:43-45, abridged, NRSV).

Jesus used these metaphors of agriculture often because his audience would relate to them. Although all sorts of professions - from fisher folk to tax collectors to religious officials - were represented in his audience, ancient Israel was at base an agricultural society. As such, he compared the evangelizing efforts of his followers to the harvest. In both Matthew and Luke, he says that the "harvest is plentiful, but the workers (laborers) are few," (Matthew 9:37 and Luke 10:2 NRSV), so he asks his followers to ask God to send more workers for the harvest, a prayer we echo today as we look around a half-filled sanctuary. The reality is we have to recruit the workers ourselves.

And what did the ancient Israelites expect from their God? No less than a return to Eden. "The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with singing." (Isaiah 35:1-2a NRSV). Like their cousins the Arabs, the Israelites pictured paradise as a well-watered garden. "With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation. And you will say in that day: Give thanks to the Lord, call on his name; make known his deeds among the nations; proclaim that his name is exalted." (Isaiah 12:3-4 NRSV). If you've noticed that a lot of the scriptures cited here are from Isaiah, that is natural, for he often used the imagery of the field in his prophecies.

Indeed, one of the most joyful images of agricultures comes from Isaiah. "For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it. For you shall go out in joy, and be led back in peace... (Isaiah 55:10-12a NRSV).

As far as the ultimate wisdom concerning our garden, it comes (of course) from Ecclesiastes, which tells us: "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted..." (Ecclesiastes 3:1-2 NRSV). It is significant that the activities of the garden come second only to birth and death; all else is listed later. Clearly, God places a premium on our gardening activities. We still look to recapture Eden.
