Our last service in the building was on March 14, 2020. Since then, we've transitioned to a shortened worship format out on the church lawn. For some of you, this change alone has been a process which has challenged your patience as well as the way you believe worship should be done. For others, this move from indoors to outdoors has been fairly seamless, and furthermore, is



simply a part of life. This change of worship is rather minimal compared to the change the disciples made along their transition from Judaism to a burgeoning new path which unfolded with each miracle, each revelation, and each prophesy fulfilled.

As a congregation we are far from alone. All places of worship have had to step into change. Some have done so very smoothly and others have taken baby steps to ensure that the congregation could let go of the old and embrace the new with some measure of assuredness. As written in Jeremiah 29:11, "For I know the plans I have for you," says the LORD. "They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope." We have every reason to believe this virus does not usher the end of our ministry. It is our responsibility to wear masks properly, social distance properly, and respect the health and space of those around us each and every day. If we sincerely believe God has a plan for our church, then we must act accordingly. Just as the health of our congregation depends on that belief, our health is also contingent upon our behavior in and out of the church setting. Please, take good care of yourselves and minimize the risks you take.

Let's get excited about what lies before us! I fully trust God to lead the way. Amen.

The books we are going to buy will all be new. We are cataloging the books we have and filling in the missing subjects, so if there is something special you want to see, you can tell us that, too. Next on the boards are a smart TV and internet connection for research and to show our DVDs. We will keep you posted as to our progress. On Tuesday August 18, your Consistory members and two guests met under the Sunday tree with masks and distancing! We had many issues to discuss which included the following:

Security

We discussed two ways to update our door security as there are again too many people with church access/keys during times when the church is empty. Our first choice will be to change the locks and insure fewer people have keys with absolutely no right to duplicate them. We will also provide cameras on the north and south doors. The second more elaborate system is to provide code boxes instead of keys at the doors (similar to real estate workers at houses for sale). These boxes can be time coded to allow access only during meeting times (i.e. AA and NA). We are not aware yet of how much this type of system will cost, but it is being researched. In the meantime, we will change the locks for now.

Internet

We will be upgrading our Wi-Fi to use for the Ring cameras and our TV. This will allow us to be able to use it both in and out of church and in the library.

Church Service

In place of meeting inside for service, we discussed the possibility of renting a tent and/or setting up our Sunday services via Zoom. With Zoom, we could actually have a more regular service with singing and prayers, sermon, etc. Some details would have to be worked out, but if you have a smart phone or a tablet with a camera, you can get on Zoom. Instructions/help will be given as needed to do this.

Pastor KC is very reluctant to use the church sanctuary until UCC gives permission and all of us can be protected from each other to properly avoid getting the virus. Come winter, we may have no choice but to go inside.

Rummage Sale and Lunch with Santa

The decision was made by Consistory and our guests Sue and Diane, to cancel the fall rummage sale. Diane asked us to table the decision regarding Lunch with Santa until November.

When the COVID pandemic hit, leadership at Michigan Humane had to make some important but difficult decisions to continue the good work but to also keep the staff safe. Although St. Paul parishioners may look upon me as a youngster, I am the oldest staff member at Michigan Humane and therefore was glad to see safety measures put in place. I was able to work from home for the first two months as we consolidated all 4 shelters into one. Our fosters stepped up taking over 400 animals out of the shelters. We rotated staff in the shelter and clinics every 2 weeks and provided training to those at home. The clinics continued to serve animals in need with curb side service which continues today.

No members of the general public are allowed into our buildings except for repair and other service individuals along with a few select volunteers. Everyone including staff must be screened at entry with questions and temperature taking. These procedures have kept us all safe and thanks to God none of our staff has been ill with the virus.



I have been back to work in the shelter for 3 months now and am glad to once again be around my furry friends. I am so thankful that my employer and my church have taken measures, that although sometimes unpopular, I feel have kept me safe.

Let's all keep up the good work keeping each other healthy so we can continue to enjoy God's blessings!

Pray for our Superintendents & all school leaders making tough decisions for our children. Pray that God will be with our teachers as they navigate new methods of teaching. Pray for God's comforting & guiding hand over our students. Pray that parents everywhere will have grace, wisdom, strength & discernment as they lead their children in the home.
